The President, Dato' Dr. Lee Cheng Yew called the house to order at 2.30 pm sharp with a quorum of 63 members present for the AGM at the time of commencement.

Before commencing the meeting, he stated that he would like to pay tribute to some of the members of AFPM who passed away last year, Prof. Datuk Dr. D.M. Thuraiappah, Dr. Ramathunisa Sheikh Ameer and Dr. Chen Man Hin. He requested the house to observe a minute of silence to give respect to them.

The President then welcomed all to the 50<sup>th</sup> Annual General Meeting of the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia and invited all present to go to the agenda for the meeting on the Annual Report as follows.

### 1. To confirm the Minutes of the previous 49<sup>th</sup> Annual General Meeting.

The President invited the general body to go through the minutes of the last Annual General Meeting held on the 23rd of April 2022 which has been circulated to all members. He then ran through minutes from pages 3 to 26 of the annual report. He then enquired if anyone had any questions on the minutes and if none, requested the minutes to be adopted.

The minutes of the last 49<sup>th</sup> Annual General Meeting were then adopted.

Proposed by Prof Dr Khoo Ee Ming and seconded by Dr Rajvinder Singh A/L Mahinder Singh.

### 2. To consider and adopt the Annual Report of Council for the period of April 2022 to April 2023.

#### d) Resolution

The President informed the house that the Honorary Secretary received two (2) Resolution six weeks prior to the AGM and which has been circulated to the General body two (2) weeks before the meeting.

- i. **Resolution 1** To accept the resignation by Prof Teng Cheong Lieng and Dr Ian Ong Chye Heng as Trustees of AFPM, submitted by Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin a/I Stalin as proposer, and seconded by Dato' Dr Lee Cheng Yew and Dr Wong Ping Foo.
- ii. **Resolution 2** To appoint new Trustees, Dr Yek Seng Chee and Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin as new Trustees submitted by Dr Aishah Mohd Zain as proposer and seconded by Dr Norsiah Ali and Dr Wong Ping Foo.

The Annual Report was then adopted, proposed by Dr Shamsath Abdul Gafoor and seconded by Dr Sasikala Devi Amirthalingam.

### 3. Consider and Adopt the Audited Statement of Accounts for Year ending December 2022 and the Report of the Auditor.

The President requested the Honorary Treasurer, Dr Aishah Mohd Zain to share and report on the audited statement of accounts.

The Honorary Treasurer, Dr Aishah Mohd Zain thanked the President and presented the financial statements of the Audited Accounts for year ending 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022 as follows:

- i) Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia
- ii) Medibase Sdn Bhd
- iii) Joint Academies Development Fund

Dr Aishah informed that the accounts were audited by the external auditors, En Ali Shah and company. She summarised the important pages starting off with the accounts of the AFPM from page 100 onwards of the Audited Accounts of the AFPM for year ending December 2022 consisting of:

- Statement by Council members
- Consolidated Statement of Financial Position

Dr Sivashanmuganathan requested to speak and enquired whether the final accounts were sent to the internal auditors for which was replied by the Honorary Treasurer that an email was sent to both Dr Sivashanmuganathan himself and Dr Isriyanti Rafae as internal auditor for the term. She informed that Dr Sivashanmuganathan did not respond, but Dr Isriyanti Rafae came to the secretariat to look at the accounts before they were sent to the external auditor.

Dr Sivashanmuganathan again stated that at the Auditors meeting with the Council, there were some queries in regard to the payment of honorariums. He enquired if those queries have been resolved. Dr Aishah Mohd Zain, Honorary Treasurer informed that it has been resolved before the final report came from the external auditors.

Dr Aishah, Honorary Treasurer then continued with the report as below:

- Consolidated Statement of Comprehensive Income
- Consolidated Statement of changes in the Members' Fund
- Consolidated Statement of Cash Flow
- > Notes to the Financial statements for year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022
- Independent Auditor's Report

The accounts of AFPM were adopted, proposed by Dr Isriyanti and seconded by Dr Rajvinder Singh A/L Mahinder Singh.

Honorary Treasurer, Dr Aishah Mohd Zain proceeded with the Medibase Sdn Bhd accounts from pages 132 to155 of the Annual Report.

Dr Sivashanmuganathan requested to speak and stated that he would like to draw the attention of the treasurer on page 155 on schedule A that payment was made to the QIP Director an allowance of RM15,000. The Honorary Treasurer confirmed that the payment was made due to the initial arrangement of QIP being put under Medibase Sdn Bhd. After that, it was moved to AFPM as part of the course. It is not under Medibase Sdn Bhd anymore.

Dr Sivashanmuganathan requested clarification from the Honorary Treasurer on Schedule A under the profit sharing for course director for RM152,900. Whereas for 2021 there was nothing. He enquired what the profit sharing for the course director is about. Dr Aishah Mohd Zain, Honorary Treasurer, explained that that amount is for the 15% profit sharing to the Course Director of Dermatology Course.

Dr Sivahanmuganathan enquired if that was a one (1) year figure or two (2) year's figures. Probably it was the figure of two years as the courses were running overlapping.

The Honorary Treasurer, Dr Aishah Mohd Zain informed that the figure shown is for 3-year accumulation due to Covid 19 pandemic when the course was suspended for one (1) year. The treasurer informed that the reporting on the AFPM and Medibase accounts has been completed and enquired if there are any other queries and if none, she requested for the accounts of AFPM to be adopted. The Medibase Sdn Bhd accounts were then adopted, proposed by Dr Samantha Teh and seconded by Dr Shamsath Gafoor.

Honorary Treasurer, Dr Aishah Mohd Zain continued with the accounts of Joint Academies Development Fund from pages 161 to 178.

Dr Sivashanmuganathan enquired on the income from carpark, etc when the building is not occupied yet and was replied by the Chairman of Council, Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin that those expenses for the current management fee at TPM, Bukit Jalil. Dr Sivashanmuganathan again enquired on the provision for tax payment of RM24,675.79. He enquired if it was due to the accounts of JADF given late before the dateline. En Ali Shah, external auditor replied to the provision payment is due to the law and not because the accounts details were not given in due time to pay the tax. It is for the tax estimation is done before the year starts. More detailed information on the tax calculations and estimation was given by En Ali Shah. The JADF accounts were then adopted, proposed by Dr Shamsath Gafoor and seconded by Dr Samantha Teh.

### 4. To elect the Council consisting of President, President Elect, Chairman of Council, Honorary Secretary, Honorary Treasurer, and Nine (9) Council Members.

The President led the house to item no. 4 in the agenda of the AGM as above. He passed the floor to the Election Committee Chair, Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha to proceed with the election process.

Dato' Dr Jaspal thanked all present and thanked fellow colleagues for coming to the elections for year 2023. He referred the house to page 92 and 93 of the Annual Report which has been circulated online as well as hard copies at the venue. He reported on the total nominations received for year 2023.

The nominations were closed on 17<sup>th</sup> March 2023, Friday by Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha, Dr Leong Kok Weng and Dr Gurunathan. The total nomination was 15, and out of which, only 9 are valid nominations. They were for the posts as listed below.

- i) Chairman of Council Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin @ Stalin
- ii) Honorary Treasurer Dr Aishah Mohd Zain
- iii) Five (5) Council members
  - Dr Sasikala Devi
  - Dato' Dr Parmjit Singh a/l Kuldip Singh
  - Dr Rajvinder Singh a/l Mahinder Singh
  - Prof Dr Khoo Ee Ming
  - Prof Kwa Siew Kim

There were no nominations for the following posts:

- i) President Elect
- ii) Four (4) Council members
- iii) A tie for the post of Honorary Secretary, there were two (2) candidates for the post,
  - 1) Dr Sivashanmuganathan a/l Sagathavan
  - 2) Dr Wong Ping Foo

Dato' Dr Jaspal informed that Dr Sivashanmuganathan subsequently had written to the election committee and to AFPM President that he wanted to withdraw from the post of Honorary Secretary. He said that this matter will be discussed later. In the interest to time, he would proceed with the nomination for the post of President Elect from the floor. He requested for nominations for the post of President Elect. There should be a proposer and

seconder and acceptance from the candidate that has been nominated. Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh informed that in this virtual meeting, the voting will be done electronically, and due diligence will be carried out on the validation of the nominations.

Dr Sivashanmuganathan requested to speak and stated that before the nominations are called for the post of President Elect, he should be allowed to withdraw from the post of the Honorary Secretary so that he will not contest for the post of Honorary Secretary. And in the event if he wished to contest for any other posts that is vacant, he should be allowed to contest. He stated that he had written to the Election Committee on his decision to withdraw every much earlier but failed to understand why Election Committee is not accepting his withdrawal.

Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha informed that the email from Dr Sivashanmuganathan was received after the ballot box was opened. A precedence will be set if we allow a withdrawal and subsequently the candidate stands for another post. The decision by the committee is that the nomination for the post of Honorary Secretary was valid and was accepted by both Dr Sivashanmuganathan and Dr Wong Ping Foo. In this situation, there will be a poll for both nominee and who gets the higher polls will win the post.

Nevertheless, if one nominee decides to withdraw, then the post automatically goes to the next nominee. But the person who withdraws from the current nominations are not allowed to stand for any other posts due to the fact that a resolution was passed at the last AGM on this matter which has been approved by the house and the Constitution was amended accordingly. Dato' Dr Jaspal then requested the house to refer to the minutes of the last AGM in the Annual Report.

More discussion on the resolution passed last year was referred to by Dr Rajvinder Singh and a precedent being set if Dr Sivashanmuganathan is allowed to be nominated for another post. Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin read through the amendment done subsequently in the Constitution after it was passed at the last AGM last year on the 23rd of April 2022.

Dr Sivashanmuganthan stated that it should be the general body that should decide on this matter and requested for the poll to be carried out on his withdrawal for the post of Honorary Secretary.

Prof Datuk Dr Sheikh Mohd Amin requested to speak and stated that no one member can apply for two (2) post. In this case, the member had requested for withdrawal, and he feels that it is right for the Chairman of the election committee to put it to the house to vote whether the withdrawal is accepted or not. That is the first thing to do. From that point, if it is accepted, then he can be allowed to contest as he did not apply for two (2) posts when the ballot box was opened.

Dr Sudhananthan requested to speak and stated that he totally agrees to what Prof Datuk Dr Sheikh Mohammad Amin said where he had clearly stated on how the process should be done in the election system. Let the general body decide first on this issue which seems to be quite dubious in the way it was explained. So, let the withdrawal part take place first and then the election process can continue. The Election Committee Chairman, Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha stated that he would like to clarify that in the norm if there was a tie, there will be vote for who gets the higher votes. He stated here in this case the two candidates had already accepted one particular post for this year 2023. If one of the candidates decides to withdraw, he is forgoing his chance now to go for another posts. This will set the precedent. In future, we are going to have the same problem.

Then the person will say that previous AGM, it was allowed. So, every time, there is a tie, this problem is going to surface repeatedly for all the other post. There must be a stop somewhere. This problem has been there for the last decade already. He stated that it is fair for the general body to decide on the withdrawal and if the general body says yes, then automatically the post goes to the other person who accepted the Honorary Secretary post, and the other person has forgone his chance for this year. There should not be a precedent set here as he had done his research on the matter from the other organisations as well e.g. MMA, AMM, College of Surgeons, and College of Physicians.

A/Prof Dato' Dr Mohammad Husni Jamal had requested to speak and stated that by allowing to do this, it is a mockery of the election system. The election committee has the authority and final decision to carry on with the election. It cannot be allowed for some to manipulate the situation just to suit oneself. Due respect needs to be given to the election process at it is and the resolution had been passed last year. He is in the opinion that the process cannot be changed.

Dr Kaviyarasan thanked A/Prof Dato' Dr Husni Jamal and requested for consensus from the Election Committee whether the decision will be taken by the Council or the general body on the withdrawal. Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha stated that for the withdrawal, the general body can decide.

Dr Elvind Yip went through the process of the voting system as below:

- > Members will be receiving nominations for the polling system.
- > Followed by an email or SMS notification.
- > Need to put the membership and the password will be the phone number.
- > Each member will be given about 20 minutes to complete the voting.

A vote for withdrawal from the post of Honorary Secretary was then carried out. Results of the poll was out of 78 members present online, 46 voted to be allowed to withdraw and 17 votes against it. The post of Honorary Secretary then automatically went to Dr Wong Ping Foo.

The Election Committee Chairman then open for nomination for the post of President Elect and 4 Council members. All nominations should have proposers and seconders of good standing. The nominations should also have the acceptance of the nominee.

He stated that members should have received an email link. He then informed that he would pass the microphone over to Dr Elvind Yip, IT Lead, to explain about the procedure in which an SMS will be sent to members to start the voting process.

Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha called for nominations for the post of **President Elect.** 

Dr Sudha Nanthan proposed **Dr Sivashanmuganathan Saga Thavan.** Dr Elangkeeran Krishnan seconded the nomination.

Dr Emma Fazilah proposed **Dr Isriyanti Rafae.** Dr Ilham Ameera seconded the nomination.

Prof Khoo Ee Ming requested to speak and said that she wanted to make a point that there were two different issues discussed by the election committee before the polling starts. There were two (2) separate proposal was mentioned.

- 1) Withdrawal from the post of Honorary Secretary where there was a tie.
- 2) Whether Dr Sivashanmuganathan who was allowed to withdraw from the valid nomination be allowed to be nominated again for another post based on the resolution that was passed at the AGM last year.

She stated that she agrees with the election committee's decision where it has been clearly explained and going by the Constitution. How she understands the Constitution is once you have accepted one post, you cannot go for another post. She stated that it is the prerogative of the person whether he or she wants to withdraw for whatever reason.

Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin thanked Prof Dr Khoo for her views and stated that the members were quite clear on what the voting was for withdrawal of Honorary Secretary post by Dr Sivashanmuganathan. At the moment nominations are taken the President Elect post, but whether it is valid nominations or not, will be decided by Election Committee based on the Constitution.

Dr Rajvinder Singh echoed the same views of Prof Dr Khoo Ee Ming and stated that nomination for one post was already accepted and it is considered that the same person cannot be allowed for another post based on the resolution passed.

Dr Kaviyarasan enquired if there were any other nominations for the post post of **President Elect.** As there were none, the nomination for the four (4) Council members were opened as below.

- 1) Dr Elvind Yip proposed **Dr Yeoh Kok Ming** for the post of Council member. Seconded by Dr Emma Zulkifli.
- Dr Sasikala Devi proposed Dr Shamsath Gafoor for the post of Council member. Seconded by Prof Dr Kwa Siew Kim.
- Prof Dr Kwa Siew Kim proposed Dr Samantha Teh for the post of Council member. Dr Sasikala Devi seconded it.
- Dr Sudha Nanthan proposed Dr Sumitra Balan for the post of Council member. Seconded by Dr Elangkeeran Krishnan.

- 5) A/Prof Dato' Dr Mohammad Husni Jamal proposed **Dr Na Wei Lun** for the post of Council member. Seconded by Dr Wong Ping Foo.
- 6) A/Prof Dato' Dr Mohammad Husni Jamal proposed **Dr Kamaruddin Kana** for the post of Council member. Seconded by Dr Norsiah Ali.
- 7) Dr Isriyanti Rafae proposed **Dr Ng Shiau Pei** for the post of Council member. Seconded by Dato' Dr Lee Cheng Yew.

All the nominations were accepted by the nominees.

Dr Sivashanmuganathan proposed that the nominations for four Council members to be closed. Seconded by Dr Elangkeeran Krishnan.

For the post of President Elect, Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin enquired Dr Isriyanti Rafae whether she accepts the nominations, and Dr Isriyanti accepted it. Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin enquired Dr Sivashanmuganathan whether he accepts the post of President Elect and was accepted by Dr Sivashanmuganathan. Dr Kaviyarasan stated that he will leave the decision to the Election Committee to decide on the validity of Dr Sivashanmuganathan's nomination.

Valid nominations for four (4) Council members stand at seven (7) and out of this, only four (4) Council members would be elected. Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha requested the house to give some time for the names to be listed down for the voting process. In the meantime, the seven (7) nominated members as listed below with their proposers and seconders were checked on the membership status.

### 5. To appoint a Public Accountant to serve as an Auditor.

The President informed that the next item in the agenda is to appoint the Public Accountant to serve as Auditor. Dr Aishah Mohd Zain proposed En Ali Shah and was seconded by Prof Datuk Dr Sheikh Mohd Amin.

The house unanimously agrees to accept the appointment of Encik Ali Shah and company as the public auditor.

### 6. To transact any other business, which ought to be transacted at the Annual General Meeting.

As there was no other business to be transacted, the President proceeded to the next item in the agenda.

#### 7. Appointment of Internal Auditors.

The President stated the next item in the agenda is to appoint two (2) internal auditors.

Dr Aishah Mohd Zain proposed Dr Ng Shiau Pei. Dr Sivashanmuganathan objected to Dr Aishah as the Honorary Treasure to propose who to be the internal auditor. He stated that nominations should be opened to the floor. Dr Rajvinder Singh seconded and enquired why the Honorary Treasurer cannot propose the internal auditor for which Dr Sivashanmuganathan replied, that it is just simply because of conflict of interest.

Prof Dr Kwa Siew Kim proposed Dr Ng Shiau Pei as the internal auditor and Dr Sasikala had seconded it.

Dr Rajvinder Singh was proposed as the internal auditor, and he accepted the post. Proposed by Dr Norsiah Ali and seconded by Shamsath Gafoor. It was then confirmed that the Internal Auditors of AFPM for the term 2023 to 2024 as below:

- **8.** To consider any Resolutions submitted to the Honorary Secretary, six (6) weeks prior to the AGM and which has been circulated to general members two (2) weeks before the Annual General Meeting.

The Honorary Secretary, Dr Wong Ping Foo informed that there are two (2) Resolutions submitted as below.

Article XIV on Trustees states, any or all Trustees may be removed from office by a resolution passed by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the members present and voting at a General Meeting.

The resolution to be accepted was proposed by Dr Sivashanmuganathan and seconded by Prof Dr Kwa Siew Kim.

Dr Sudhananthan requested to speak and stated that there is no need for a proposer and seconder for someone who wants to resign. It is for the house to accept or not to accept the resignation.

#### The house unanimously agreed that Resolution 1 be hereby passed.

Article XIV on Trustees states, all Properties of the Academy in so far, they relate to immovable property shall be vested in four Trustees elected by the Academy in the Annual General Meeting and Council shall fill vacancies, as when they arise, subject to approval at the next Annual General Meeting.

Dr Kaviyarasan enquired the general body if there is any conflict in him being the Trustee and that if there is, he will withdraw. Dr Sudhananthan stated that he is not sure if he as the Chairman of Council can also be the Trustee. He does not know about it, that's why he is asking.

Dr Aishah Mohd Zain requested to speak and stated that all this while, Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin has been involved in the new Academies Building and he has been with the Academy longer years than the current EXCO / Council members so he would know better on the Academy. That was the reason why she proposed Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin to become the Trustee of the new building. Dr Aishah felt that there was no conflict of interest.

Dr Sudhananthan stated that he has no problem with Dr Kaviyarasan to be proposed as the Trustee as he is the perfect candidate for the post. The question here is can he take up the post as Trustee when he is already the Chairman of Council for the AFPM. Dr Aishah enquired why not as there is no conflict of interest or any issues in carrying out work.

Dr Sivashanmuganathan stated that Dr Aishah does not understand what conflict of interest is. Dr Kaviyarasan stated that he will withdraw and requested other suggestions from the members.

### 1) Dr Yek Sing Chee as one of the new Trustee was accepted and passed by the house unanimously.

Dr Sivashanmuganathan proposed Prof Dr Khoo Ee Ming as the Trustee if she agrees. Prof Dr Khoo Ee Ming declined the proposal.

Dr Sivashanmuganathan stated that Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin as the Chairman of Council and Trustee cannot be wearing two hats as Trustee where crucial decisions needed to be taken. It is a dangerous position and for his own interest, Dr Kaviyarasan should not be the trustee. Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin announced that he will withdraw his nomination as the Trustee and hoped that the general body can accept it. Dr Sivashanmuganthan proposed Dato' Dr Lee Cheng Yew and was seconded by Dr Kaviyarasan Sailin.

Dato' Dr Lee Cheng Yew enquired if there are someone else who can accept to be the Trustee and proposed Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha because he has been a member of AFPM for so many years. Dr Shamsath Gafoor seconded the proposal.

Dr Leong Kok Weng enquired if the position as the Trustee will affect Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha's position in the election committee.

Dr Sudhanathan said that trustee is a very risky position. He is thinking more in terms of protection for Dr Kaviyarasan. Trustees need to know about the statute and can be held liable. Trustees should not resign and walk out in time of crisis.

A/Prof Dato' Dr Mohammad Husni Jamal agreed that Dr Kaviyarasan should not be burdened with Trustee post at the moment. He proposed Dato' Dr Kamalanathan to be the trustee and was seconded by Dr Gnanasegaran Xavier.

Both Dato' Dr Kamalanathan and Dato' Dr Lee Cheng Yew declined to be the Trustee. The general body agreed for nomination of Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha to stay as the Election Committee Chairman and Trustee. Proposed by Dr Elangkeeran Krishnan and seconded by Prof Dr Kwa Siew Kim.

The Board is advised by the Chief Examiner, Dr Lili Zuryani and the Dean of Graduate Studies, Prof. Datuk Dr Sheikh MA. I would like to thank all of them for their good work and dedication in doing the work that has been entrusted to them.

Meetings were held formally on the following dates:

- 1. 28th April 2023
- 2. 9th July 2023
- 3. 30th December 2023

The rest of the time, discussions were held via WhatsApp group and emails and matters were recorded and filed in the BOC file and/or candidates' files accordingly.

Activities of the board include vetting of the applications for membership and entry applications for GCFM and ATFM programmes. We also vet the applications to sit for the Final GCFM examinations, Part I and Part II Conjoint MAFP/FRACGP/icFRACGP examinations. We strictly follow the criteria stated inside the AFPM Postgraduate Courses Guideline and Policy Handbook. Candidates who did not meet the criteria of the programme or examinations were not allowed to proceed. And those who enrolled on the programme with falsified documents or information were thoroughly investigated and if found guilty will be removed from the programme.

Board members conducted a few practice visits to applicants' practices to assess practice suitability for GCFM or ATFM programme. We also conducted practice visits before Part II Conjoint MAFP/FRACGP/icFRACGP examinations as required by the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP). As part of our effort for continuous improvement of the training programmes we routinely review the rules and regulations for the programme, examinations, admission criteria and examination eligibility criteria. We also reviewed and made improvements to the AIMS systems with support from our IT members.

The Board of Censors is responsible for quality assurance of the Part I and Part II Conjoint MAFP/FRACGP/icFRACGP examinations. Upon completion of the Part I examination, the Censor-in-Chief conducted QC of the examination mark for all candidates to ensure that no errors with the result. Following the release of the Part I result, we release the Part II exam application and practice diary instruction to all eligible candidates. Vetting of Part II exam application and practice diaries were completed 8th – 9th July 2023. Upon completion of vetting, we identified clinics for routine practice visits. Visits to clinics outside of the Klang Valley area were conducted remotely. Upon completion of all BOC tasks, a report on candidates' profiles with all their practice diaries was uploaded to RACGP Censor as part of the accreditation requirement. Upon completion of Part II examination, again the Censor-in-Chief conducted QC on candidates' marks. The result was ratified by RACGP during the post-examination meeting conducted via Zoom on 22nd September 2023.

Upon release of the Part II result, the BOC assisted our successful Part II candidates with their FRACGP/icFRACGP application documents. The applications must be vetted and endorsed by Censor-in-Chief before they are sent to RACGP.

The year 2024 activity started with the opening of the exam application for Part I Conjoint MAFP/FRACGP/icFRACGP Year 2024 on 1st November 2023 and preparation for the convocation 2024.

As part of the ongoing RACGP Training Provider Accreditation requirement, AFPM is required to submit six-monthly reports to RACGP Education Accreditation Committee. And this was done successfully as scheduled.

Lastly, I would like to take this opportunity to thank EXCO and council members past and present, and especially to the ATFM Faculty members and their various boards, for their encouragement and support, their dedication and great teamwork to make all the work easier.

The 2023 Part 1 Conjoint MAFP/icFRACGP Examination was successfully held online on the 11-12 March 2023 at four UNIKL IT centres in West Malaysia to ensure reliable and secured internet connection under the direct supervision of selected examiners. 208 candidates sat for the examination.

- a) AKT Paper on 11 March 2023
- b) KFP Paper on 12 March 2023

Total number of candidates passed Part 1 Exam = 107 Repeaters from previous year = 13 Total eligible candidates for Part 2 Exam = 120

# The Conjoint MAFP/icFRACGP Part 2 Examination was successfully held physically on 2-3 September 2023.

For the first time, the examination was held at the Exam Ward, Level 3, Hospital Sultan Abdul Aziz Shah (HSAAS), Serdang in view of the large number of candidates and exam circuits required, also considering security/quarantine requirements.

- Total number of candidates = 117
- > Total number of examiners = 51 examiners + 10 trainee examiners
- Total number of exam coordinators = 17
- Total number of AFPM Staffs = 16

Number of QA Examiners = 4 Internal QA examiners (Dr Tan Chow-Wei, Prof Datuk Dr Sheikh MA, Dr Teoh Long Chee, Dr G Xavier) and 2 External QA Examiners (Dr Tess van Duuren and Dr Rebecca Lock). Dr Tess was also the RACGP censor-in-chief while Dr Rebecca was the RACGP national assessment advisor on CCE.

There was a total of twelve exam stations with 6 stations per day over 5 circuits (Circuit A-E). Total of 3 sessions per exam day (0820-1020H, 1100-1300H, 1400-1600H)

# 1. Clinical Competency Examination (CCE) cases:

CD= Case Discussion, CE= Clinical Encounter

- **Day 1** Peer Level Discourse (CD), Elderly Health (CE), Short Term Care (CD), Emotional Health (CE), Long Term Care (CD) and Practical Procedure (CE)

# 2. Changes to the 2023 Part 2 examination include:

- iii. Emphasis on "word cloud" rating following rubrics as opposed to key features checklist.
- iv. Real time marking and assessment by raters as well as QA examiners.
- v. Online central timer using Zoom incorporated into the marking tablets. (Brainchild of IT Lead Dr Elvind Yip.)
- vi. Candidates submitting their feedback online during post examination quarantine period (previously done after they return home).

- vii. Examination results to candidate includes a competency band to compare individual performance vs average performance of the passing cohort.
- viii. Candidates receive their results via online login to AFPM database.

The CCE Panel vetted the exam cases multiple times and did a trial run of all the cases for feasibility, especially with time allocation and quality assurance.

Each CCE panel member also sat in during the two standardization meetings that each station must have, led by the station master. During these meetings, the station must standardize the delivery of the station as well as discuss the standard setting for the case. AFPM QA examiners sat in at the standardization meeting. These meetings are held online after office hours – 8.30pm onwards. A final meeting was held at the exam venue on the day before the exam with a final practice run before the exam. RACGP QA examiners attended the meetings for the stations they were rostered for.

The committee members elected in 2022 continued to serve the Chapter of Teachers (CoT) in 2023. In addition to the existing members, four new committee members were elected in 2023 to help and ensure smooth running of the activities conducted by the CoT.

In 2023, the CoT were given a new task of managing not only the Trainee Mentor and Mentors but also the Supervisors for the ATFM Programme. Hence, the current core activities of the CoT are:

- 1. Mentor Training and Workshop
- 2. Mentoring Sessions
- 3. Supervisor Training
- 4. Supervisor Sessions
- 5. Centralized Workshops Clinical teaching sessions
- 6. MAFP/iCFRACGP Examination Involvement of mentors as invigilators and examiners

# Mentor Training / Workshops

We successfully conducted 2 workshops in 2023. The first workshop was conducted on 22.07.2023 in the Armada Hotel and it involved the 6 committee members as well as 2 staff members. The purpose of the workshop is to introduce the CoT tasks to the new members and to update and plan on the running of CoT activities for 2023 / 2024.

The second workshop was the highly successful Basic Teaching and Learning & National Postgraduate Medical Curriculum (NPMC) Course in the Royale Chulan Damansara Hotel on the 5th - 6th August 2023. This workshop was conducted in collaboration with the NPMC and UiTM. The number of speakers involved were 13, with 12 facilitators and 60 mentors.

As for an update on the number of mentors, the total number of active mentors was 129, of which 26 were involved as mentors for the ATFM Intake 12 and 39 for the ATFM intake 13. They continue to do the monthly marking of assignments and mentoring sessions. The number of trainee mentors approved in 2022/2023 was 20 and they will undergo the tagging sessions in 2024 and have to complete their NSR registration before being appointed as a full mentor for the ATFM. The EXCO has approved another 21 new trainee mentors in 2023.

The CoT continues to encourage all graduates of the MAFP/icFRACGP and Family Medicine Specialists to become mentors and contribute towards the advancement of the Primary Care fraternity in Malaysia.

### **Supervisors Training and Sessions**

A new structured supervision method was introduced for trainees who are private General Practitioners (GP) in 2023. This includes scheduled monthly chart audit sessions with selected supervisors, who are senior mentors.

WhatsApp discussion groups for the Klinik Kesihatan Supervisor and the Supervisors have been established to ease communication and information dissemination. The information for supervisors was also uploaded into the eLMS or the online learning platform under the ATFM Supervisor Module. Briefing sessions for the supervisors were done online on the 17th of October 2023.

### **Centralized Practice Workshop (CPW)**

CoT had contributed actively in the CPW. A total of five CPWs were successfully conducted in year 2023. The following CPWs were held:

#### ATFM Intake 11

CPW2: 12 February 2023 (Module GIT, ENDO, GERI, HOP) CPW3: 26 November 2023 (Module GUSS, WOM, MEN, EEN, PAEDS)

#### ATFM Intake 12

CPW1: 4 March 2023 (Module CVS, RESPI, PSY, MSK) CPW2: 16 July 2023 (Module GIT, ENDO, GERI, HOP) CPW3: 22 October 2023 (Module GUSS, WOM, MEN, EEN, PAEDS)

The trainees were given opportunity to practice in the stations based on the Clinical Competency Examination format followed by constructive feedback from the facilitators. In CPW3, the trainees had the chance to practice on Clinical Examination Skills in one of the stations. The trainees gained valuable insights and skills enhancement from the CPWs.

#### Eligibility Examination & MAFP/iCFRACGP Examination

Selected trainee mentors and mentors continue to be involved as invigilators as well as examiners for the examinations.

# Publication

In 2023, CoT have also successfully published 2 handbooks for the mentors and supervisors (with eISBN under AFPM Publisher).

# Annual Report for Malaysian Family Physician 2023

### A. Publication of the Regular and Supplement Issues in 2023

MFP achieved a new milestone in 2023, with publication of 73 articles, where 36 are original research and review articles. This has increased from 62 articles (34 original research and review) published in 2022. MFP maintained the required standard to be indexed in the Journal Citation Report (JCR) under the ISI-Web of Science.

One notable change in 2023 was that MFP adopted the continuous publication mode instead of publishing articles in three issues per year. This means that all articles were published as soon as possible instead of queuing to be published in an issue. This publication mode ensures knowledge is disseminated in a timely manner.

Additionally, two conference abstracts were published in 2023:

- 25<sup>th</sup> Family Medicine Scientific Conference
- 9<sup>th</sup> Asia Pacific Primary Care Research Conference



# B. Number of articles and the types of articles submitted to MFP.

In 2023, the Malaysian Family Physician (MFP) received a total of 207 articles (Table 1). The number of original research articles received has exceeded 100 articles for the first time in history. This is a good indication that MFP has gained prominence among researchers as a choice to publish their research outcomes, and a good sign of being regarded as a high-quality scientific journal by the ISI-Journal Citation Report.

Apart from original research articles, case reports received also increased from 35 articles in 2022 to 53 articles in 2023. This year, MFP received the highest number of letters to editor (20 articles) over the years too, which showed good readership and interaction among authors through the journal. The number of A Moment in the Life of A Family Physician article also increased to nine articles this year.


# F. MFP Reviewer Workshop








How relevant and helpful do you think it was for guiding you in reviewing journal manuscript? 21 responses







# G. Changes in the Editorial Board



# J. The journal submission portal (Open Journal System – OJS)

MFP has been using the OJS to manage all articles submitted. OJS is an open source software (free), hence there is no monitoring nor technical support available from the software provider. There were two virus attacks in MFP's OJS in Aug23 and Oct23. Editors and authors faced issues in OJS such as unable to access file; alignment problem; cannot register new account. The programmer managed to rectify the issues after several days. Approximately two weeks of MFP's operation were disrupted. More effort is needed to maintain, fortify and improve the OJS system in the subsequent year.

#### K. Application to be indexed in the JCR/ISI

MFP has submitted the application to be indexed in the Clarivate's Journal Citation Report (JCR) on 14 March 2023. However, the progress is stagnant and MFP is still in Stage 1 evaluation. Enquiries were made to Clarivate about the progress on 25 Jun 2023 and 16 Nov 2023 but MFP was asked to wait for the outcome.



# About the JCR indexing criteria

The Journal Citation Report (JCR)/ISI-Web of Science has a four-stage evaluation process for journals to enter the Emerging Sources Citation Index (ESCI) and potentially the Science Citation Index Expanded (SCIE). The first three stages, initial triage, editorial triage, and editorial evaluation, cover 24 criteria and the MFP editorial board has been working to fulfill these criteria over the past 12 months. Upon passing these 24 criteria, MFP will enter the ESCI in JCR. However, to enter the SCIE, a more rigorous evaluation on Impact Analysis consisting of 4 criteria will be conducted by the JCR team.






#### Feedback from Participants:

The feedback from participants was inclusive of the APPCRC and ASM. There was a total of 34 respondents. All respondents found the overall scientific content good or excellent. 44% found the workshops most useful.

Majority reported willingness to recommend the conference to friends. However, in individual comments, there was a suggestion to separate the ASM and APPCRC so that focus could be given to both events.

#### 3.8 Credentialing Committee Report 2023

Previously known as credentialing process, a candidate who has successfully passed his/her Professional Examination and Training in the field of Family Medicine under the Parallel Pathways (non-MOH candidates) need to undergo a period of supervised work attachment under supervision by a Family Medicine Specialist at a government health clinic i.e., Klinik Kesihatan before applying for registration as a Specialist in Family Medicine under the National Specialist Registry (NSR).

Prior to 2019, successful candidates who do not go through MOH gazettement process will apply for credentialing process via NSR for Family Medicine. In 2019 Malaysian Medical Council gave the mandate to AFPM to undertake this credentialing process for these candidates. After several discussions with MOH (BPKK), this credentialing process commenced in 2020. After further discussion with MOH, "Credentialing Process' was renamed to 'Supervised Post Qualification Work Experience Posting' in 2022.

In 2023, the committee continued with online meetings and had 4 meetings (every three months) to vet new applications, to review logbook of candidates who had completed their posting and to discuss any issues pertaining to the MOH posting.

This year we received and approved 16 new applications to start their posting in 2023. Nine specialists had successfully completed their credentialing process and were issued the certificate of completion.

The success of the celebration can be attributed to its emphasis on acknowledging family factors, the synergy of collaborative endeavours, and a steadfast commitment to future initiatives.



# 3.10 Postgraduate Training in Family Medicine under the Academy of Family Medicine of Malaysia (AFPM)

#### **Report for Quality Improvement Programme 2023**

#### Background

The Quality Improvement Programme (QIP) for Training was first set up in 2018 to ensure quality in the training of doctors undergoing the 4-year Family Medicine (FM) postgraduate training course; the first two years of which, is an on-line distance-learning culminating in the award of the Graduate Certificate in Family Medicine (GCFM). This is followed by another two years of Advanced Training in Family Medicine (ATFM) in which mentors are assigned to meet trainees monthly for teaching.

QIP activities are held during the 3rd and 4th year of training during the Advanced Training in Family Medicine (ATFM). The first QIP rolled out in August 2021 with Intake 10 Year 1 on the virtual platform due to the pandemic. Currently we have progressed to face-to-face visits to those clinics within 35 km to the Practice Assessor. The QIP activities are case-based discussions and the QIP Practice Visit which is a precepting session. The objectives of the QIP case-based discussion and precepting sessions are mainly to teach, assess and provide feedback on candidates' workplace-based performance to improve clinical competencies. The case-based discussions sessions are conducted during the monthly mentoring sessions using the cases from the trainee's logbook for discussion. The Practice Assessor, either online or face-to-face, of the trainees' consultation of four cases at their workplace. QIP Practice visits (precepting sessions) are conducted once each during ATFM Years 1 and 2. Practice Assessors should preferably be trainees' own Mentor so that remediation can be continued, and trainees' progress tracked during the monthly mentoring sessions.

We now have a total of 105 trained Practice Assessors. Training for the Practice Assessors is held during the Mentor Training workshop. A briefing on QIP process and standard operating procedures for internet technology requirements for the online sessions is always given before the start of the QIP session for the intake for Practice Assessors and Trainees

#### QIP activities in 2023:

There was a move to face-to- face sessions for the Practice Visit in 2023. Intake 11 year 2 and Intake 12 Year 1 and Intake 12 Year 2 completed their QIP Practice Visits in 2023.

#### Feedback:

The feedback from trainees and Practice Assessors has been positive as there is one-to-one observation and feedback on the trainee's consultation and clinical performance. Practice Assessors are able to identify their trainees' needs and support them during the following mentoring sessions to improve their clinical competencies.





#### Introduction

Men's Health is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being experienced by men, not merely the absence of disease. In keeping with the World Health Organization's globally recognized definition of health, a healthy man is empowered to experience optimum physical, mental, and social well-being and experiences health as a resource for everyday living.

Compared to that of women, the health of men has been a relatively neglected subject. Women's health, particularly sexual and reproductive health, has become important for biological, political, and social reasons. Gender perceptions also have a crucial bearing on men's health. How a man perceives oneself as 'masculine' or 'macho' has impacted the value of their health and their health-seeking behaviour.

Aligned with the National Men's Health Plan of Action Malaysia 2018-2023, the provision of health promotion, education, prevention, and treatment services targeted at men could be expanded within healthcare facilities to accommodate the local community.

Erectile dysfunction (ED) is often underdiagnosed as doctors do not routinely enquire about this problem because of a lack of knowledge and experience. The prevalence of ED in Malaysia varies between 26.8% and 69%, contributed by unhealthy lifestyles among men, which may lead to cardiovascular diseases, hypertension, diabetes mellitus, and dyslipidemia. With the high prevalence of ED among men, there is a need to venture into this program and prepare to cater to men's sexual dysfunction.

- 1. Introduction to men's health and to outline some of the health problems specific to men.
- 2. Common terminology pertinent to caring for men with sexual dysfunction.
- 3. To promote men's health via sexual and reproductive health education
- 4. To improve men's health by empowering them to live responsibly and to seek appropriate health care services.
- 5. To encourage healthcare personnel to manage patients via a patient-centered approach confidently using the latest evidence-based medicine.
- 6. Separating Myths and Facts about men's health.

# 5. Building – Medical Academies

## **AKADEMI PERUBATAN MALAYSIA**

**MEDICAL ACADEMIES MALAYSIA** will be an iconic building befitting its status as the home for the Medical Academies and Medical Fraternities of Malaysia.

Our previous building in Jalan Tun Razak was compulsorily acquired by the government in 2017 after paying compensation. The land was owned by the two academies at 2/3:1/3 ratio (AMM/AFPM). A joint venture agreement (JVA) signed on 27th August 2006 guides us. A Joint Academies Development Committee (JADC) was formed to find a suitable land and build an iconic building with the necessary facilities.

Academies Management Committee (AMC) formed a dedicated Building Task Force (BTF) on 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2019 for the purpose of construction equipping and commissioning of the new Medical Academies Building.

The Academy of Medicine of Malaysia and the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia have forged ahead with getting a new home in Plot 8C8 Precinct 8, Putrajaya. The sales and purchase agreement signing ceremony for buying the land was held on 20th July 2020 between both the Academies and the Putrajaya Holdings Sdn Bhd on a boat cruise. This auspicious occasion would also go down in the history of both the Academies as a major step in our vision of getting an iconic building in Putrajaya. It was our fervent hope at that time that this building would be completed within 24 to 26 months.

The Academies were greatly honoured that YABhg Tun Dr Mahathir bin Mohamed laid the foundation stone at a ceremony on 10th October 2022 at the construction site itself. YABhg Tun Dr Mahathir bin Mohamed is an Honorary Fellow of both Academies. He was accompanied by YABhg Tun Dr Siti Hasmah binti Mohd Ali, who is also an Honorary Fellow.

#### CHALLENGES FACED

The BTF has been presenting the building budget at many meetings and had tried to keep to the budget as low as possible. However, along the way the unforeseen global economies confronted by a range of geopolitical situations like the ongoing Russian-Ukraine war and the lingering Covid-19 pandemic had worsened the situation. These pressures are felt across economies, exemplified by inflation and subsequent interest rate hikes, supply chain disruptions, energy price hikes, and a hot labour market. All these necessitated the increase in the building cost project in which the contracted sum is RM43,388,000.00 and with the consultants' professional fees added to it is RM48,048,000.00. At the last BTF meeting held on 30<sup>th</sup> March 2024, this has ballooned to RM56,573,283.00. This includes all the variation orders as well and causes the budget to be overrun further. Therefore, the BTF has urged the AMC and the 2 Academies to look into this budgetary shortfall.

# DELAY IN THE COMPLETION OF THE BUILDING PROJECT

The original date for the completion of the building project was on 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2023. Due to the effects of the unexpected global turmoil including the Covid-19 pandemic, this was pushed later to 23<sup>rd</sup> August 2023 and then to 26<sup>th</sup> October 2023, and so on.

The slow progress has resulted in extra costs resulting in the contractor claiming for extension of time (EOT).

# CERTIFICATE OF PRACTICAL COMPLETION (CPC) & COMPLETION CERTIFICATE OF COMPLIANCE (CCC)

- a) The CPC is issued when all the physical works for the development works as specified in the contract are satisfactorily completed. This is issued by the architect or superintendent to the contractor when all physical works for the development as specified in the contract, are deemed to have been practically completed.
- b) Once, the CPC (between the contractor & and the owner) is issued, the owners can take possession of the building and shift in items like furniture, but the occupants cannot move in yet until the CCC is issued.
- c) The CCC is a certificate that certifies the completion of the building construction. It is a statutory requirement indicating that the developer has followed all regulatory regulations. The granting of a CCC indicates that a property is now safe to occupy. It can only be granted by a professional engineer or architect. The is subject to the final inspection/approval by the PJC.
- d) The inspection for the CCC is done in stages as it comprises of 21 construction components relating to the stage certification.
- e) It is not necessary for both certificates (CPC & CCC) to be issued on the same day. The time laps could range from weeks to months.

Once the contractor hands over the building to the Academies, the warranty period for the defect liability commences which is for 12 months period.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

## 1. SOCIETY INFORMATION

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the Council of The Academy (The Council) in accordance with a resolution of the Council on 16 March 2024.

The principal place of business of the Academy is at Unit 1.5, Level 1, Enterprise 3B, Technology Park Malaysia (TPM), Jalan Innovasi 1, Lebuhraya Puchong – Sungai Besi, 57000 Bukit Jalil, Kuala Lumpur.

The principal activity of the Academy is to provide courses, promote and maintain high standard among general medical practitioners.

## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Academy have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise indicated in this summary of significant accounting policies. The financial statements comply with the applicable Malaysian Private Entity Reporting Standards and the provisions of the Societies Act, 1966 in Malaysia.

## b) Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

## i) Recognition and measurement

Property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss.

Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. The cost of self-constructed assets includes the cost of materials and direct labour, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the working condition for its intended use, and the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located. When parts of an item of property, plant, and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

## ii) Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the Academy and its cost can be measured reliably. The costs of the day-to-day servicing of the property, plant, and equipment are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as incurred.

## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## b) Property, plant and equipment and depreciation (Continued)

## iii) Disposals

Gain or loss arising on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined by comparing the net disposal proceed with the carrying amount of property, plant and equipment and is recognised net within other income in the statement of comprehensive income on the date of disposal.

## iv) Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated over the depreciable amount, which is the cost of an asset, or other amount substituted for cost, less its residual value.

Property, plant and equipment under construction are not depreciated. Depreciation on other property, plant and equipment is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income on the reducing balance basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment, since this most closely reflects the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the asset.

The annual rates used for this purpose are as follows:

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed, and adjusted as appropriate, at each reporting date.

## c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash represents cash and bank balances. Cash equivalents comprise items which are readily convertible to cash with insignificant risk of change in value. For the purposes of the cash flow statements, cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and at bank, demand deposits and short-term highly liquid investments which have an insignificant risk of changes in value.

## d) Financial instruments

## i) Loan and Receivables

Loan and receivables are financial assets with fixed or determined payments that are not quoted in an active market. Such assets include the Academy's trade receivables, other receivables, as well as cash and cash equivalents.

The assets are recognised at cost plus any directly attributable transaction costs.

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## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## d) Financial instruments (Continued)

## ii) Other financial liabilities

The Academy's other financial liabilities include trade payables, sundry payables and accruals, term loans and amount due to related Academy.

Such financial liabilities are recognised at cost plus any directly attributable transaction costs.

## e) Provisions for liabilities

Provisions are recognised when the Academy has a present legal and constructive obligation as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

## f) Impairment of assets

## i) Financial assets (including receivables)

A financial asset is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial assets is impaired if objective evidence indicates that a loss event has occurred after the initial recognition of the assets, and that the loss event had a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of that assets that can be estimated reliably.

Objective evidence that financial assets are impaired include (although not limited to) the following events: default or delinquency by a debtor, restructuring of an amount due to the Academy on terms that the Academy would not consider otherwise, indications that a debtor or issuer will enter bankruptcy, and the disappearance of an active market for the security.

Financial assets are generally assessed for impairment on an individual basis. However, for certain categorise of financial assets, such as trade receivables, assets that are assessed not to be impaired individually are subsequently assessed for impairment on a collective basis based on similar risk characteristics.

Objective evidence of impairment for a portfolio of receivables could include the Academy's past experience of collecting payments, an increase in the number of delayed payments in the portfolio past the average credit period and observable changes in national or localeconomic conditions that correlate with default on receivables.

All impairment losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

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## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## f) Impairment of assets (Continued)

## ii) Non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of the Academy's non-financial assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, the assets recoverable amounts are estimated.

An impairment loss is charged to the statement of comprehensive income in the period in which it arises, unless the asset is carried at revalued amount. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is recognised directly against the revaluation surplus account for that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount held in the revaluation surplus account.

Impairment losses recognised in prior years are assessed at each reporting date for any indications that the loss has decreased or no longer exists. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates use to determine the recoverable amount. An impairment loss is reversed to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised. Reversals of impairment losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

## g) Employee benefits

## i) Short term benefits

Wages, salaries, paid annual leave and sick leave, bonuses, and non-monetary benefits are accrued in the financial year in which the associated services are rendered by employees of the Academy.

## ii) Defined contribution plans

The Academy makes contributions to the Employees Provident Fund in Malaysia, a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions to the defined contribution pension scheme are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related services are performed.

## h) Revenue recognition

The Academy includes in revenue only the gross inflows of economic benefits received and receivable by the Academy. The amounts collected on behalf of third parties such as sales taxes, goods and services taxes and value added taxes are excluded from revenue.

- i) Revenue from services is recognised when:
  - a) it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Academy;
  - b) the costs incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be measured reliably; and
  - c) upon the delivery of services and acceptance by customers.

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## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## h) Revenue recognition (Continued)

ii) Interest Income

Interest income on fixed deposits is recognised on accrual basis.

## iii)Subscription Fee

Subscription fee is recognised on receipt basis.

iv)Enrolment Fees

Enrolment fee is recognised on receipt basis.

## v) Life Membership Fee

Life membership fee is recognised on receipt basis.

vi)Income from Joint Venture (JADF)

The share of the profits from the Joint Venture is based on the agreed profitsharing ratio of 1/3:2/3 between the Academy and the other joint venturer, respectively.

## i) Income tax

## i) Current tax

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Current taxes are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income except to the extent that the tax relates to items recognised outside profit or loss, either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

## ii) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences at the reporting date between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except where the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses, to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised except where the deferred tax asset relating to the deductible temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

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## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## i) Income tax (continued)

## ii) Deferred tax (continued)

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax assets to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are reassessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profit will allow the deferred tax assets to be utilised.

## j) Basis of Consolidation

## i) Subsidiaries

Subsidiaries are all entities (including special purpose entities) over which the Academy has control. The Academy controls an entity when the Academy is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the relevant activities of the entity. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Academy. They are deconsolidated from the date that control ceases.

The Group applies the acquisition method to account for business combinations. The consideration transferred for the acquisition of a subsidiary is the fair values of the assets transferred, the liabilities incurred to the former owners of the acquiree and the equity interests issued by the Group. The consideration transferred includes the fair value of any asset or liability resulting from a contingent consideration arrangement and fair value of any pre-existing equity interest in the subsidiary. Identifiable assets acquired and liabilities and contingent liabilities assumed in business combination are, with limited exceptions, measured initially at their fair values at the acquisition date. The Group recognises any non-controlling interest in the non-controlling interest's proportionate share of the recognised amounts of acquiree's identifiable net assets.

Acquisition-related costs are expensed as incurred.

If the business combination is achieved in stages, the carrying value of the acquirer's previously held equity interest in the acquiree is remeasured to fair value at the acquisition date and any corresponding gain or loss is recognised in the profit or loss.

Any contingent consideration to be transferred by the Group is recognised at fair value at the acquisition date. Subsequent changes to the fair value of the contingent consideration that is deemed to be an asset or liability is recognised in profit or loss. Contingent consideration that is classified as equity is not remeasured, and its subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity.

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## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## j) Basis of Consolidation (continued)

## i) Subsidiaries (continued)

Goodwill is initially measured as the excess of the aggregate of the consideration transferred, the amount of any non-controlling interest and the fair value of any previous equity interest in the acquiree at the acquisition date over the fair value of the net identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed. If the total consideration transferred, non-controlling interest recognised and previously held interest measured is less than the fair value of the net assets of the subsidiary acquired, the difference is recognised directly in the profit or loss as a gain on bargain purchase.

## ii) Changes in ownership interests in subsidiaries without change of control

Transactions with non-controlling interests that do not result in loss of control are accounted for as equity transactions – that is, as transactions with the owners in their capacity as owners of the Group. A change in ownership interest results in an adjustment between the carrying amounts of the controlling and noncontrolling interests to reflect their relative interests in the subsidiary. The difference between fair value of any consideration paid and the relevant share acquired of the carrying value of net assets of the subsidiary is recorded in equity. Gains or losses on disposals to noncontrolling interests are also recorded in equity.

## iii) Disposal of subsidiaries

When the Group ceases to have control, any retained interest in the entity is remeasured to its fair value at the date when control is lost, with the change in carrying amount recognised in profit or loss. The fair value is the initial carrying amount for the purposes of subsequently accounting for the retained interest as an associate, joint venture or financial asset. In addition, any amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income ("OCI") in respect of that entity are accounted for as if the Group had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities. This means that amounts previously recognised in OCI are reclassified to the profit or loss. Gains or losses on the disposal of subsidiaries include the carrying amount of goodwill relating to the subsidiaries sold.

### k) Investment in Subsidiaries

A subsidiary is an entity in which the Academy has power to exercise control over the financial and operating policies so as to obtain benefits from its activities. In assessing control, potential voting rights that presently are exercisable are taken into account.

The investment in subsidiary companies is accounted at cost less impairment losses. On disposal of such investments, the difference between net disposal proceeds and their carrying amounts are included in the profit or loss.

The policy for the recognition and measurement of impairment losses is in accordance with Note 2 (f).

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## 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## l) Interest in Joint-Ventures (JADF)

The Academy has entered a joint venture with the Academy of Medicine of Malaysia, the College of Surgeons of Malaysia and College of Physicians for the purpose of undertaking the purchase or acquisition of any land and/or building and/or construction of an academic building on behalf of the parties to the said joint venture. The joint venture is an unincorporated entity and is referred to as the Joint Academies Development Fund (hereinafter referred to as "the JADF"). The Academy has a 33.33% (1/3) interest in the said joint venture.

The Academy Medical Colleges is the custodian of monies attributable to the Academy in respect of the accounts of the joint venture, the JADF.

The interest in joint venture, the JADF is accounted for using the equity method of accounting. The equity investment in the JADF is initially recognised at the transaction price (including transaction costs) and is subsequently adjusted to reflect the Academy's share of the profit or loss and other comprehensive income of the JADF.

## 3. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The preparation of the Academy's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the reporting date. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the assets or liability affected in the future.

## (i) Estimated Useful Lives of Property, Plant and Equipment

The Academy reviews annually the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment based on factors such as business plans and strategies, expected level of usage and future technological developments. Future results of operations could be materially affected by changes in these estimates brought about by changes in the factors mentioned. A reduction in the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment would increase the recorded depreciation and decreases the net book value of property, plant and equipment.

## (ii) Impairment of Receivable

The Academy assesses at each reporting date whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset is impaired. To determine whether there is an objective evidence of impairment, the Academy considers factors such as the probability of insolvency or significant financial difficulties of the debtor and default or significant delay in payments.







## NOTE TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

#### 1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

The Company is a private limited company incorporated and domiciled in Malaysia.

The registered office is located at No. 8A, Jalan Vivekananda, Off Jalan Tun Sambanthan, Briekfields, 50470 Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

The principal place of business is located at Unit 1-5, Level 1, Hive 4 Taman Teknologi Mranti, Jalan Inovasi 1, Lebuhraya Puchong-Sungai Besi, 57000 Bukit Jalil Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

The principal activities of the Company are providing support to the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (the holding entity) in providing courses and training to general medical practitioners. There have been no significant changes in the nature of the activities during the financial year.

The financial statements of the Company are presented in Ringgit Malaysia ("RM"), which is the functional currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates.

#### 2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Malaysian Private Entities Reporting Standard ("MPERS") and the requirements of the Companies Act, 2016 in Malaysia.

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared under the historical cost convention except as otherwise stated in the financial statements.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MPERS requires the directors to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses and disclosure of contingent assets and contingent liabilities. In addition, the directors are also required to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the accounting policies. The areas involving such judgements, estimates and assumptions are disclosed in Note 5 to the financial statements. Although these estimates and assumptions are based on the directors' best knowledge of events and actions, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### 3. DATE OF AUTHORISATION OF ISSUE

The financial statements of the Company were authorised for issue by the Board of Directors on 18 March 2024.

#### 4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to the periods presented in these financial statements and have been applied consistently by the Company, unless otherwise stated.

## a. PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

All items of property, plant and equipment are initially measured at cost. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when the cost is incurred and it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the asset would flow to the Company and the cost of the asset could be measured reliably. The carrying amount of parts that are replaced is derecognised. Cost also comprises the initial estimate of dismantling and removing the asset and restoring the site on which it is located for which the Company is obligated to incur when the asset is acquired, if applicable.

For major component of an item of property, plant and equipment which have significantly different patterns of consumption of economic benefits, the initial cost of the asset shall be allocated to its major components and depreciate each such component separately over its useful life.

After initial recognition, property, plant and equipment except for freehold land are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Except for freehold land and properties under construction which are not depreciated, depreciation is provided on a straight-line method so as to write off the depreciable amount of the following assets over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

#### Teaching aids and equipment

20%

Depreciation of an asset begins when it is ready for its intended use.

If there is an indication of a change in factors affecting the residual value, useful life or asset's depreciation method since the last annual reporting date, the residual values, depreciation method and useful lives of depreciable assets are reviewed, and the changes are accounted for as a change in an accounting estimate and adjusted prospectively.

The carrying amounts of items of property, plant and equipment are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from their use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising from the derecognition of items of property, plant and equipment, determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amounts of the item, is recognised in profit or loss.

## b. IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS

At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether there is any indication that an asset (excluding investments in subsidiaries and associates, deferred tax assets, investment properties measured at fair value) may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

#### 4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

## b. Impairment of non-financial assets (continued)

When there is an indication that an asset may be impaired but it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of the individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

The recoverable amount of an asset and a cash-generating unit is the higher of the fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the future cash flow estimates have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset or a cash-generating unit is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised to reduce the carrying amount to its recoverable amount.

The impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately.

All assets that suffered impairment loss are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at each reporting date. An impairment loss is reversed to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation, if no impairment loss had been recognised in prior periods. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

#### c. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Financial instruments are recognised on the statement of financial position when the Company has become a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. At initial recognition, a financial instruments is recognised at transaction price, including transaction costs if the financial instruments is not measured at fair value through profit or loss, except a financing transaction. Financing transactions are measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Basic financial instruments include cash, debt instruments (receivables and payables), commitments to receive loans that cannot be settled net in cash, investments in non-convertible preference shares and non-puttable ordinary or preference shares.

## i. Financial Instruments that are Debt Instruments measured at Amortised Cost

At the end of each reporting period, an entity shall measure financial instruments as follows, without any deduction for transaction costs the entity may incur on sale or other disposal.

Subsequent to initial recognition, debts instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, whilst commitments to receive a loan are measured at cost less impairment.

#### 4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### c. Financial instruments (continued)

## i. Financial Instruments that are Debt Instruments measured at Amortised Cost (continued)

Effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of financial assets and of allocating the interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimate future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial assets or, when appropriate, a shorter period, to the carrying amount of the financial assets.

A financial asset is derecognised when the contractual right to receive cash flows from the financial asset has expired or settled.

#### ii. Financial Assets at Fair Value through Profit or Loss

Financial assets are classified as at fair value through profit or loss when the financial assets are within the scope of Section 12 of the MPERS or if the financial assets are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably without undue cost or effort.

Changes in fair value are recognised in profit or loss.

If a reliable measure of fair value is no longer available for an equity instrument that is not publicly traded but is measured at fair value through profit or loss, its fair value at the last date that instrument was reliably measurable is treated as the cost of the instrument, and it is measured at this cost amount less impairment until a reliable measure of fair value becomes available.

## iii. Financial Assets that are Equity Instruments measured at Cost less Impairment

Equity instruments that are not publicly traded and whose fair value cannot otherwise be measured reliably without undue cost or effort, and contracts linked to such instruments that, if exercised, will result in delivery of such instruments, are measured at cost less impairment.

A financial liability is derecognised only when it is extinguished, i.e. When the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires. An exchange between an existing borrower and lender of financial instruments with substantially different terms are accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability. Similarly, a substantial modification of the terms of an existing financial liability is accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability.

Any difference between the carrying amount of a financial liability extinguished or transferred to another party and the consideration paid, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

#### 4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

## d. IMPAIRMENT OF FINANCIAL ASSETS

At the end of each reporting period, the Company assesses whether there is any objective evidence that financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost, are impaired.

The Company collectively considers factors to determine whether there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on loans and receivables has occurred.

If there is objective evidence that impairment losses have been incurred on financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the amount of impairment losses are measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate.

The carrying amounts of the financial assets are reduced through the use of an allowance account. Any impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately. If, in subsequent period, the amount of an impairment loss decreases, the previously recognised impairment losses are reversed directly, except for the amounts related to trade receivables which are reversed to write back the amount previously provided in the allowance account. The reversal is recognised in profit or loss immediately.

#### e. CASH FLOW STATEMENTS

The Company adopts indirect method in the preparation of cash flow statements.

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand, balances and deposits with banks and highly liquid investments which have an insignificant risk of changes in fair value with original maturities of three months or less, and are used by the Company in the management of their short term commitments. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents are presented net of bank overdrafts and pledged deposits, if any.

#### f. EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

#### i. Short term benefits

Wages, salaries, bonuses and social security contributions are recognised as an expense in the year in which the associated services are rendered by employees. Short term accumulating compensated absences such as paid annual leave are recognised when services are rendered by employees that increase their entitlement to future compensated absences. Short term non-accumulating compensated absences such as sick leave are recognised when the absences occur.

#### ii. Defined contribution plans

The Company makes contributions to the Employee Provident Fund in Malaysia, a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions to defined contribution pension schemes are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is performed.

#### 4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### f. Employee benefits (continued)

#### iii. Termination benefits

Termination benefits are recognised as a liability and an expense when the Company is demonstrably committed to either terminate the employment of the employees before the normal retirement date, or provide termination benefits as a result of an offer made for voluntary redundancy. The Company is demonstrably committed to a termination when the Company has a detailed formal plan for the termination and are without realistic possibility of withdrawal.

Termination benefits in relation to the offer made to encourage voluntary redundancy are measured based on the number of employees expected to accept the offer.

#### g. INCOME TAXES

Income taxes include all domestic taxes on taxable profit. Income taxes also include other taxes, such as withholding taxes, that are payable by the Company, and real property gains taxes payable on disposal of properties, if any.

Tax payable on taxable profit for current and previous periods is recognised as a current tax liability to the extent unpaid. If the amount paid in respect of the current and past periods exceeds the amount payable for those periods, the excess is recognised as a current tax asset.

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amounts expected to be paid or recovered, using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the reporting date.

Current tax liabilities and assets are offset if, and only if the Company has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and plan either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Deferred tax is recognised in full on temporary differences which are the differences between the carrying amounts in the financial statements and the corresponding tax base of an asset or liability at the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is not recognised in respect of the temporary differences associated with the initial recognition of an asset or a liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and at the time of the transactions, affects neither accounting profit nor taxable profit. Deferred tax are also not recognised for temporary difference associated with the initial recognition of goodwill.

A deferred tax asset is recognised only to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits would be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and unused tax credits can be utilised. The carrying amount of a deferred tax asset is reviewed at the end of each reporting period. If it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits would be available to allow the benefit of part or all of that recognised deferred tax asset to be utilised, the carrying amount of the deferred tax asset would be reduced accordingly. When it becomes probable that sufficient taxable profits would be available, such reductions would be reversed to the extent of the taxable profits.

#### 4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### g. Income taxes (continued)

Deferred tax liabilities and assets reflect the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects to recover or settle the carrying amounts of their assets and liabilities and are measured at the tax rates and laws that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the reporting date.

Changes in current or deferred tax balances are recognised as an income tax expense or credit and are recognised in the same component of comprehensive income or equity as the transaction that resulted in the tax expense or credit.

#### h. EQUITY INSTRUMENTS

Ordinary shares are classified as equity.

Equity instruments are measured at the fair value of the cash or other resources received or receivable, net of the direct costs of issuing the equity instruments. If payment is deferred and the time value of money is material, the initial measurement is on a present value basis.

#### i. **REVENUE RECOGNITION**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, net of discounts and rebates.

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction would flow to the Company, and the amount of revenue and the cost incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be reliably measured and specific recognition criteria have been met for the activity of the Company as follows:

#### i. Rendering Of Services

Revenue from rendering of services is measured by reference at net of services taxes and discounts as and when the services are performed.

#### 5. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATES

The preparation of the Company's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the reporting date. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in the future.

#### a. JUDGEMENTS MADE IN APPLYING ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The management did not make any critical judgment in the process of applying the Company's accounting policies that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

#### 5. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATES (continued)

## b. KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the accounting policies of the Company which are described in Note 4, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are discussed below:

#### i. Useful lives of plant and equipment

The Company regularly reviews the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment based on factors such as business plan and strategies, expected level of usage and future technological developments. Future results of operations could be materially affected by changes in these estimates brought about by changes in the factors mentioned above. A reduction in the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment would increase the recorded depreciation and decrease the value of property, plant and equipment.

#### ii. Recoverability of receivables

The Company makes allowance for doubtful receivables based on an assessment of the recoverability of trade and other receivables. An allowance is established for trade and other receivables where events or changes in circumstances indicate that the balances may not be collectible. The identification of doubtful receivables requires use of judgment and estimates. Where the expectation is different from the original estimate, such difference will impact the carrying value of the trade and other receivables and doubtful receivables expenses in the period in which such estimate has been changed.

#### iii. Deferred tax assets

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all unused tax losses, unabsorbed capital allowances and unused reinvestment allowances to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the losses, capital allowances and reinvestment allowances can be utilised. Significant management judgement is required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and level of future taxable profits. The total carrying value of recognised capital allowances, unrecognised tax losses, capital allowances and reinvestment allowances of the Company was given in notes to the financial statement.

## 5. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATES (continued)

#### b. Key sources of estimation uncertainty (continued)

#### iv. Impairment of property, plant and equipment

The Company assesses impairment of assets whenever the events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable i.e. the carrying amount of the asset is more than the recoverable amount. Recoverable amount is measured at the higher of the fair value less cost to sell for that asset and its value in-use. The value-in-use is the net present value of the projected future cash flow derived from that asset discounted at an appropriate discount rate. Projected future cash flows are based on Company's estimates calculated based on historical, sector and industry trends, general market and economic conditions, changes in technology and other available information. The assumptions used, results and conclusion of the impairment assessment are stated in the Note 6.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS 31 DECEMBER 2023

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

Joint Venture Agreement (JVA) and Trust Deed between the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (AFPM) and the Academy of Medicine of Malaysia (AMM) was ceremoniously signed on 28th July 2019 for the purpose of undertaking the purchase of land and/or building and/or the construction of academic building including the long-term development, operation and management of the academic building(s) to be acquired and/or erected.

The Parties hereby agree to change the name of the fund account held in the bank from "Joint Colleges Land Development Fund Account" to "Joint Academies Development Fund (JADF)"

The Parties hereby confirm and agree that the money in the JADF account, any land(s) and/or building(s) and/or property(ies) to the purchased, acquired and/or built shall be owned by the Parties in the following share(s):-

- (a) AFPM shall own one-third (1/3) share; and
- (b) AMM shall own two-third (2/3) share

The Parties mutually agreed to form a Joint Board of Trustees to oversee the management of Joint Academies Development Fund (JADF), which for the purpose of the Trust/Trust Deed shall be deemed to be the Trust Account. To strengthen the business of this partnership, if was mutually agreed that Joint committee(s) such as the Academies Management Committee (AMC) and the Finance Committee (FC) be formed and shall be reporting and answerable to Joint Board of Trustees.

Joint Board of Trustees is authorized by the Parties to ensure that the Compensation Monies in the JADF shall primarily be utilized for financial management of the temporary office space, the purchase of land and/or buildings or for the construction of new academies building(s) and funds for academic development for the Parties.

#### 2. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of Joint Venture have been prepared in accordance with the Malaysian Private Entities Reporting Standard ("MPERS").

#### 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below :

#### 3.1 PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to Joint Venture and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. After recognition as an asset, an item of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Except for freehold land and building under construction which are not depreciated, depreciation is provided on a straight-line method so as to write off the depreciable amount of the following assets over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

Depreciation of an asset begins when it is ready for its intended use.

If there is an indication of a significant change in factors affecting the residual value, useful life or asset consumption pattern since the last annual reporting date, the residual values, depreciation method and useful lives of depreciable assets are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively.

The carrying amounts of items of property, plant and equipment are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from their use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising from the derecognition of items of property, plant and equipment, determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amounts of the item, is recognised in profit or loss.

#### 3.2 FINANCIAL ASSETS

Financial assets are recognised in the statement of financial position when Joint Venture becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, financial assets are measured at transaction price.

After initial recognition, financial assets are classified into financial assets that are debt instruments measured at amortised cost.

#### i) Financial Assets That Are Debt Instruments Measured At Amortised Cost

After initial recognition, debt instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are classified as current assets are measured at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

#### ii) Impairment Of Financial Assets

At the end of each reporting period, Joint Venture assesses whether there is any objective evidence that financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost, are impaired.

Impairment losses, in respect of financial assets measured at amortised cost, are measured as the differences between the assets' carrying amounts and the present values of their estimated cash flows discounted at the assets' original effective interest rate.

The carrying amounts of the financial assets are reduced directly, except for the carrying amounts of receivables which are reduced through the use of an allowance account. Any impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately. If, in subsequent period, the amount of an impairment loss decreases, the previously recognised impairment losses are reversed directly, except for the amounts related to receivables which are reversed to write back the amount previously provided in the allowance account. The reversal is recognised in profit or loss immediately.

#### iii) Derecognition Of Financial Assets

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial assets expire, or are settled, or Joint Venture transfers to another party substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial assets.

On derecognition of financial assets in their entirety, the differences between the carrying amounts and the sum of the consideration received and any cumulative gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period of the transfer.

#### 3.3 CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents in the statement of cash flows comprise fixed deposits with a licensed bank, cash and bank balances.

#### 3.4 FINANCIAL LIABILITIES

Financial liabilities are recognised in the statement of financial position when Joint Venture becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, financial liabilities are measured at transaction price.

After initial recognition, financial liabilities are classified into financial liabilities measured at amortised cost.

## i) Financial Llabilities Measured At Amortised Cost

After initial recognition, financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss when the financial liabilities are derecognised or impaired.

## ii) Derecognition Of Financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Any difference between the carrying amounts of the financial liabilities derecognised and the consideration paid is recognised in profit or loss.

#### 3.5 REVENUE

Income is recognised on an accrual basis unless collectability is in doubt, in which case they are recognised on receipt basis.
