The President, Dr Isriyanti Mohd Rafae called the house to order at 10.00 am sharp with a quorum of 55 members present for the AGM.

The President then welcomed all to the 52nd Annual General Meeting of the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (AFPM) and thanked all for giving her the honour in heading this organisation.

During her tenure for the past one (1) year, she informed that she went through an interesting journey which was memorable for her. It has polished and sharpened her skill to lead an organization. There were many things that she learned and ventured together with all the members.

Her initial task was to represent AFPM in the Malaysian Patient Safety Council. She was also representing AFPM in the *Jawatankuasa Penasihat Radiologi (RAC)* and *Lembaga Penduduk Dan Pembangunan Keluarga Malaysia (LPPKN)*.

Madam President invited all present to go to the agenda for the meeting on the Annual Report as follows.

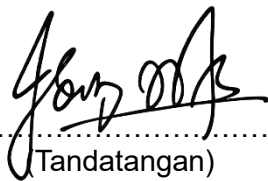

The faculty has also started restructuring the GCFM & ATFM programs while enhancing the robustness of the programs. From year 2026, there will be only one intake for GCFM.

The Certificate course of Point of Care Ultrasound (POCUS) for GPs is making good progress and is scheduled to start in mid-2026.

I am happy to mention that all our academic programs are well subscribed and run well.

Our Conjoint MAFP-FRACGP/ICFRACGP program had been successfully reaccredited in 2025. Our heartfelt thanks to the accreditation team led by CiC Dr Anis Ezdiana.

I would like to thank all members of the faculty for the excellent work they have done in their respective program, the details of which are in their respective report. Special thanks to our IT Team (Ts Saufi Omar, Afdal, Hanim) and Academy's staff for their effort in making the delivery of the program and examinations a success.

We would like to express our sincere gratitude to the two Censors who completed their duties with the Board of Censors (BOC) on 31 December 2025. Their dedication to upholding the faculty's standards is deeply appreciated.

The Board continues to be guided by the expertise and leadership of the Chief Examiner, Dr Lili Zuryani, and the Dean of Graduate Studies, Prof. Datuk Dr Sheikh Mohd Amin. We extend our heartfelt appreciation to both and to all Board members for their valuable contributions and steadfast commitment to fulfilling their responsibilities.

Formal Board meetings were convened on 3 August 2025 and 7 December 2025. In addition, ongoing discussions and deliberations were conducted via WhatsApp and email, with all decisions and matters appropriately recorded and filed in the BOC master file and/or individual candidates' files.

The Board's core responsibilities include vetting AFPM membership applications and entry applications for the GCFM and ATFM programmes. We also review applications to sit for the Final GCFM Examination, as well as the Part I and Part II Conjoint

MAFP/FRACGP/icFRACGP examinations conducted in collaboration with the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP). All vetting processes are conducted in strict adherence to the criteria outlined in the AFPM Postgraduate Courses Guideline and Policy Handbook. Candidates who do not meet the specified programme or examination requirements are not permitted to proceed. Any individual found to have enrolled using falsified documents or information is subject to thorough investigation and, if found guilty, removal from the programme.

Board members conducted several practice visits to applicants' clinics to assess suitability for the GCFM and ATFM programmes. Practice visits were also carried out prior to the Part I and Part II Conjoint examinations, as required by RACGP accreditation standards.

As part of our commitment to continuous quality improvement, the Board regularly reviews and updates rules and regulations governing training programmes, examinations, admission criteria, and eligibility requirements. In addition, we have reviewed and enhanced the AIMS system, with strong IT team support, to better serve trainees and administrators.

The Board of Censors is responsible for quality assurance of the Part I and Part II Conjoint examinations. Upon completion of the Part I examination, the Censor-in-Chief conducted quality control of marks for all candidates to ensure accuracy. Following the scheduled release of Part I results on 21st May 2025, instructions for Part II applications were disseminated to eligible candidates. A special online briefing on the Part II examination was held on 23rd May 2025 at 8:00 pm, conducted by the Chief Examiner and the Censor-in-Chief.

Upon completion of the Part II application vetting process, clinics were identified for routine practice visits. Once the list of eligible candidates was finalised, a comprehensive report of candidates' profiles was submitted to the RACGP Censor to fulfil accreditation requirements. During the Part II examination, and for the first time this year, the BOC assigned two Censors to oversee quality assurance of examination logistics and provide pastoral support to trainees. On Day 2 of the examination, quality control of candidates' marks commenced and was completed within one day after the examination concluded. The verified results were subsequently handed over to the Examination Committee for data analysis.

The Part II results were formally ratified by RACGP during the post-examination meeting held via Zoom on 17 October 2025. Upon release of results, the BOC assisted successful candidates with their FRACGP/icFRACGP application documentation, which was vetted and endorsed by the Censor-in-Chief prior to submission to RACGP.

The Board would also like to inform members of an important update regarding Fellowship awards from the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP). Effective 1 March 2026, RACGP will cease the award of the FRACGP qualification to AFPM graduates. Candidates who successfully complete the Conjoint MAFP examination pathway after this date will be awarded the icFRACGP award in accordance with RACGP's revised policy.

The Board has ensured that all affected trainees have been formally notified of this change and has provided guidance regarding application timelines and documentation requirements. We remain committed to supporting our graduates throughout this transition to ensure clarity and continuity in their professional recognition.

The Board of Censors successfully oversaw and coordinated AFPM's 2025 reaccreditation as a training provider with the Royal Australian College of General

Practitioners (RACGP). Through a comprehensive review of documentation, robust quality assurance processes, and close engagement with stakeholders, the Board ensured compliance with all accreditation standards and governance requirements. This achievement reaffirms AFPM's commitment to maintaining rigorous educational standards and sustaining its recognised status as an accredited training provider.

Following this reaccreditation, the Board was required to develop and implement a formal Policy on Training Site Accreditation. This mandate has been duly fulfilled. The policy was officially launched on 15 January 2026 during a special webinar titled "*Step into AFPM Specialist Training 2026: GCFM and ATFM Pre-Training Orientation Webinar*". The guideline is now available on the AFPM website for reference and implementation by all current and prospective training sites.

During the webinar, prospective trainees were formally briefed on the new Training Site Accreditation Policy. A structured walkthrough of accreditation requirements, key standards, and submission processes was provided. Participants were also shown a sample accreditation submission to guide them on documentation format, required supporting evidence, and the expected level of detail.

Members of the Board of Censors underwent dedicated training on 7 December 2025 on the newly implemented policy to ensure consistency, transparency, and fairness in evaluation. The session focused on standardised assessment criteria, documentation review protocols, and decision-making frameworks to promote uniform vetting outcomes across applications. This initiative further strengthens the governance integrity and upholds high accreditation standards.

Lastly, we would like to express our sincere appreciation to EXCO and Council members, past and present, and especially to the ATFM and GCFM Faculty members and their respective boards, for their encouragement, dedication, and exemplary teamwork. A special thank you is also extended to the AFPM Secretariat, whose efficiency and commitment ensure that the faculty's operations continue to run smoothly and effectively.

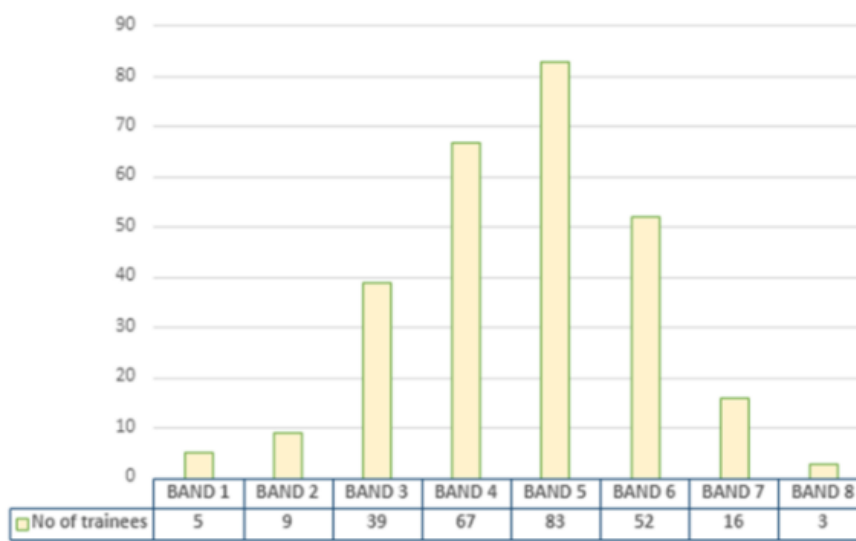

This year, the examination was conducted at UiTM Selayang Campus, Selangor on 27–28 September.

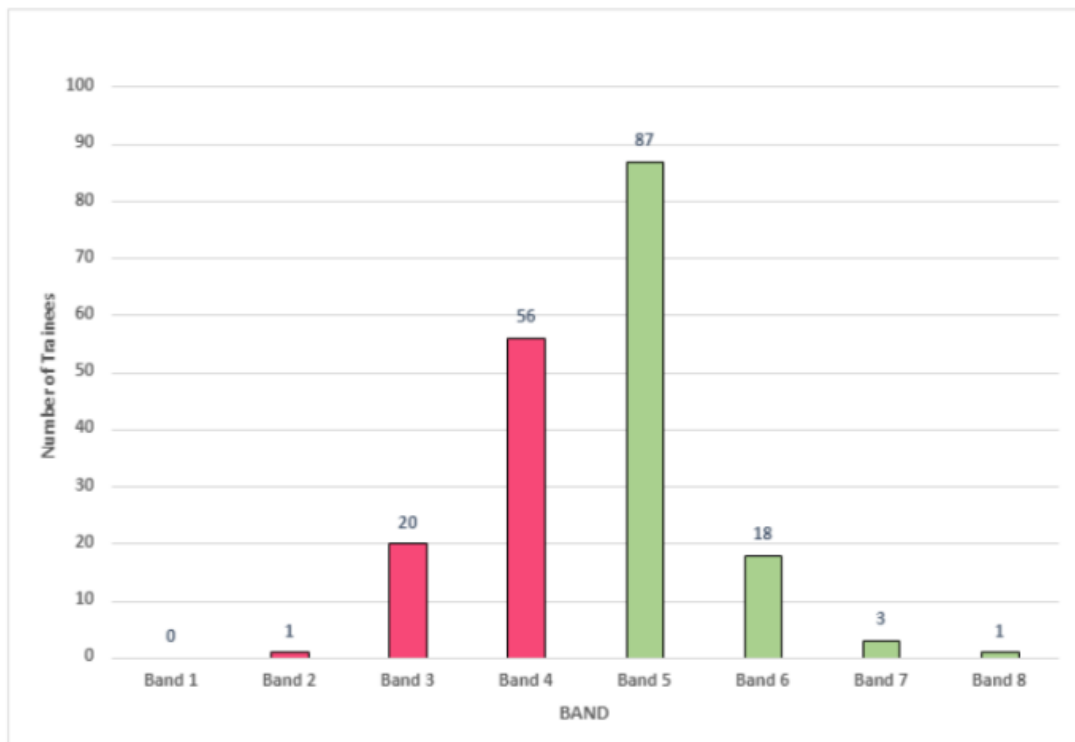
- Total number of candidates = 186

Each station lasted for 10 minutes, with 5 minutes of reading time.

3.5. Annual Report of Chapter of Teachers (CoT)

There was a change in the committee lineup beginning June 2025. Dr Wong Ping Foo was appointed as the new Chairperson, succeeding Associate Prof Dr Ilham Ameera Ismail. Dr Gan Chia Ying was appointed as the Deputy Chairperson. In addition, three new committee members (Dr Loke Yean Yee, Dr Marina Antony Nicolson and Dr Chan Hiang Ngee) were appointed to fill the vacant positions.

The Chapter of Teachers would also like to place on record its sincere appreciation to the past COT Chairperson Dr Lili Zuryani Marmuji and Assoc Prof Dr Ilham Ameera Ismail and for their dedicated contributions to COT. The foundation they helped build continues to guide the ongoing development of COT activities.

In alignment with the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) terminology, the designation “mentors” has been revised to “academic supervisors.” In 2025, COT continued to carry out its core activities, namely:

- a. COT Training Workshop
- b. Mentoring Sessions
- c. Clinical Supervisor Training Sessions
- d. Centralized Practice Workshops - Clinical teaching sessions
- e. MAFP/ICFRACGP Examination

1. COT Training Workshop

One COT Teaching and Learning Workshop was successfully conducted in collaboration with the Quality Improvement Programme (QIP) on 26–27 July 2025. A total of 74 academic supervisors attended the workshop.

In addition, 10 academic supervisors who had not yet obtained their National Postgraduate Medical Curriculum (NPMC) Certificates were given the opportunity to participate in the 4th NPMC Training of Trainers Course in Family Medicine (Online).

The training comprised:

- Asynchronous online modules: 22 August 2025 – 30 September 2025
- Synchronous sessions: 23–24 September 2025

2. Mentoring Sessions

Academic supervisors continued to conduct monthly assignment marking and mentoring sessions for trainees. Newly appointed trainee academic supervisors undergo training and tagging sessions. Upon completion of training and registration with the National Specialist Register (NSR), they will be formally appointed as academic supervisors.

The COT continues to encourage all graduates of the MAFP/ICFRACGP programme and Family Medicine Specialists to become academic supervisors and contribute towards the advancement of the primary care fraternity in Malaysia.

3. Clinical Supervisors Training Sessions

The structured supervision model introduced in 2023 for trainees who are private General Practitioners (GPs) was continued in 2025. This includes scheduled monthly chart audit sessions with selected GP supervisors.

For trainees posted in Klinik Kesihatan (KK), their respective Family Medicine Specialists (FMS) were appointed as clinical supervisors. Clinical supervisors oversee the day-to-day clinical practice of trainees and provide regular feedback.

Briefing sessions for supervisors were conducted as follows:

- ATFM Intake 15 KK Supervisors: Online briefing on 29 September 2025
- GP Supervisors: Online briefing on 30 September 2025

In addition, WhatsApp discussion groups for both KK and GP supervisors continued to facilitate communication and information sharing. Relevant resources and updates for supervisors were also uploaded to the e-Learning Management System (e-LMS) under the ATFM Supervisor Module.

4. Centralised Practice Workshops (CPW)

COT continued to contribute actively to the CPW.

In February 2025, COT had the opportunity to conduct the CPW for the first time at the Medical Academies Building.

The following CPWs were successfully conducted in 2025:

- **ATFM Intake 14 – CPW1**
8 February 2025
Modules: CVS, Respiratory, Psychiatry, Musculoskeletal
- **ATFM Intake 14 – CPW2**
20 July 2025
Modules: Gastrointestinal, Endocrinology, Geriatrics, Health of Older Persons
- **ATFM Intake 14 – CPW3**
12 October 2025
Modules: Genitourinary, Women's Health, Men's Health, ENT/Eye, Paediatrics
- **ATFM Intake 15 – CPW1**
8 November 2025
Modules: CVS, Respiratory, Endocrinology, Musculoskeletal, Neurology

During the workshops, trainees were given the opportunity to practice clinical scenarios using stations based on the Clinical Competency Examination format, followed by constructive feedback from facilitators. Trainees also had the opportunity to practice clinical examination skills.

5. MAFP/ICFRACGP Examination

The COT works closely with the Board of Examiners to identify trainees and academic supervisors to serve as invigilators and examiners for the examinations. COT extends its sincere appreciation to all academic supervisors who have generously dedicated their time and expertise to support AFPM educational activities.

Recent Updates

Beginning January 2026, a restructuring of the COT Committee was undertaken. The QIP portfolio was assigned to COT. Dr Loke Yean Yee was appointed as the second Deputy Chairperson of COT, with responsibilities related to Workplace-Based Assessment (WBA). COT would also like to express its sincere appreciation to Dr Sasikala Devi A/P A. Amirthalinga, Dr Anisha K Nijar, and Dr Husna Hanin Abdul Rahim, who have stepped down from the committee due to other commitments. Dr Lai Wei Jie and Dr Nur Syahida were subsequently appointed as new committee members.

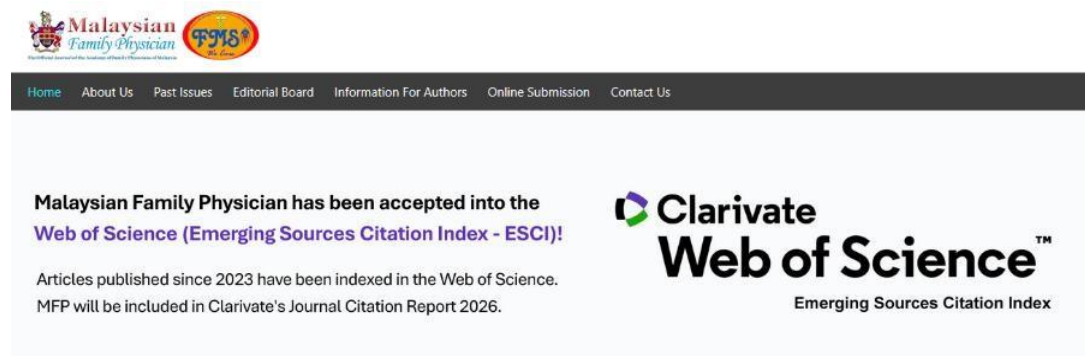

3.5. Annual Report of Editorial Board (Malaysian Family Physician)

A. Acceptance of MFP into Web of Science / Clarivate's Journal Citation Report

The editorial board is delighted to announce that MFP was accepted into the Web of Science under the Emerging Sources Citation Index (ESCI) category in 2025. MFP articles published since 2023 (starting from the date of submission of application) are indexed in the Web of Science. In addition, MFP will be included in the Clarivate's Journal Citation Report starting from 2026. This is usually published in June/July every year. This achievement would not be possible without AFPM's continuous support in MFP.



MFP will continue to strive to achieve the Science Citation Index Expanded (SCIE) category under Web of Science, which is considered the ultimate goal a scientific journal could aim for. To enter SCIE, there are four final Impact Criteria to accomplish, and these include:

- Comparative citation analysis
- Author citation analysis
- Editorial board citation analysis
- Content significance

The editorial board has discussed and strategised MFP's direction towards achieving these.

B. Publication of the Articles and Supplement Issues in 2025

In 2025, MFP published 80 articles, which is more than 2024 (72 articles). Among the 80 articles, there were 35 original research and review articles. Original research and review articles are important article types that are used for Impact Factor calculation in the Clarivate Journal Citation Report (JCR) under the Web of Science.

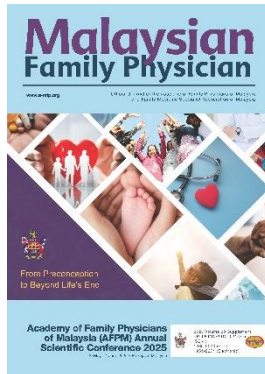

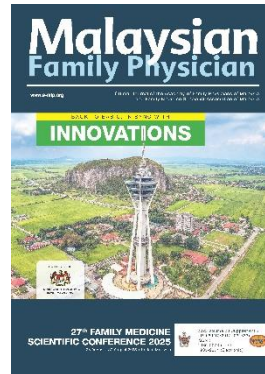

C. Number of articles and the types of articles submitted to MFP

In 2025, the Malaysian Family Physician (MFP) received a total of 156 articles (Table 1). The most article received were original article (n=63), followed by case reports (n=54) and review articles (n=14). The number of articles submitted to MFP decreased in 2025 as compared to 2024, which could be due to submission fee imposed starting from 1 Jan 2025. However, this is acceptable as the aim of the journal is to publish high-quality articles. The imposition of submission fees will encourage authors to carefully consider the quality of their manuscripts before submitting them. This will also help reduce the workload of the editorial board members and administrative staff by minimizing the handling of poor-quality manuscripts that would ultimately be rejected. In addition, the number of articles published in 2025 is higher than in 2024. This proves that the reduction in submissions did not affect the final number of high-quality publications.

G. Setting up of A New Journal Management System (Editorial Manager)

MFP has been utilizing a free journal management system (Open Journal System – OJS) to manage article processing works. As a free system, it has various gaps which lengthen review process, in particular:

- lack of a reviewer database
- lack of reviewer auto-invitation queuing system
- lack of safety features - some emails did not reach reviewers / went to spam folder
- limited customization – cannot be fully tailored to MFP's needs – some tasks need to be handled separately out of the system
- no support from original developer, which hurdles any customization

It is expected that more articles will be submitted to MFP after being announced in the Clarivate's Journal Citation Report in June 2026. A better system is desired to efficiently manage higher article volume and peer review processes.

The editorial board was grateful that AFPM has approved this request, and the system is currently being set up, and some workflows are being adjusted. Training sessions will be held, and the system will be piloted before being launched.

H. Policy on the Use of Artificial Intelligence

MFP has implemented the policy of the use of generative artificial intelligence tools such as ChatGPT which is applicable to authors, reviewers and editors of MFP. The details are as shown below:

POLICY ON THE USE OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE: MFP adopts the World Association of Medical Editors' (WAME) recommendations on chatbots and generative artificial intelligence use in scholarly publications. Please visit [WAME's website](#) to read the detailed recommendations. Below is the AI use policy applicable to authors, reviewers and editors of MFP:

FOR AUTHORS:

- **AI cannot be an author:** AI and AI-assisted tools cannot be listed as authors. Only human beings can meet the criteria for authorship and be accountable for the work.
- **Authors are responsible for content:** Authors should not use AI tools to generate content of a study. Data fabrication and falsification are considered serious research misconduct. If an AI tool was used in any way to support manuscript preparation, authors must carefully review, edit, and fact-check any outcomes generated by the AI tools. Authors must ensure that the output of any AI tool does not plagiarise or misrepresent existing work.
- **Authors must disclose any use of AI tool:** If an AI tool was used in any way during the preparation of the manuscript, it must be disclosed in the Acknowledgements section of the manuscript. Authors should describe the use as detailed as possible for transparency purposes. If AI was used as part of the research methodology (instead of generative AI tools for writing assistance), it should then be described in the Methods section.

FOR REVIEWERS/EDITORS:



- **Reviewers/editors should not upload or input confidential information from unpublished manuscripts to AI tools:** All manuscripts assigned to reviewers/editors should be treated as confidential. If a manuscript is uploaded to an AI tool, confidentiality may be breached as the manuscript has been retained on a third-party cloud server. Reviewers/editors should also not upload any part of the manuscript such as a selected paragraph, table or figure to an AI tool.
- **Reviewers/editors should disclose any use of AI tools to assist the reviewing work:** If an AI tool was used to assist with the reviewing activities (e.g., to improve comment writing, summarise key points or look for references), it must be disclosed to the editor/Chief Editor.
- **Reviewers/editors are fully responsible for the evaluation of a manuscript:** Reviewers/editors are responsible for all comments, suggestions, and recommendations in the review, even if an AI tool was used in their generation.
- **Reviewers/editors should flag their concerns to the editors/Chief Editor if inappropriate AI use by authors is suspected:** MFP now requires authors to disclose any AI use for manuscript preparation in the Acknowledgement section. If inappropriate AI use by the authors is suspected, it should be escalated to the editorial board for further investigation.

I. MFP Submission and Publication Fee

MFP is an open access journal and levies Submission and Publication Fees for original research, review and case report articles starting from 1 Jan 2025. The two main reasons for this are:

- to cover the increasing operating costs of MFP
- to reduce the submission of low-quality articles to MFP

As MFP is adopting a commercial journal management system (Editorial Manager), the submission and publication fee is revised for 2026.

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Submission and Publication Fees

MFP is an open access journal and levies **Submission and Publication Fees for original research, review and case report articles starting from 1 Jan 2025**. These fees help ensure the sustainability of the journal's operations, including journal management system, copy editing, design and open access costs for the authors' articles.

All authors need to make an inter-bank transfer of a **Submission Fee (RM50 for Malaysian; USD20 for non-Malaysian)** when submitting these types of articles. Payment of the submission fee does not guarantee article acceptance. Therefore, authors should ensure that their article is **relevant to primary care/family medicine; contains new important learning points; is methodologically sound; and follows all the formatting requirements** before submitting it to our journal. The article will only be processed and reviewed after the payment has been received.

REVISED PUBLICATION FEE (1 JAN 2026 ONWARDS)

We are excited to announce a major investment in our journal's infrastructure to enhance the author and peer-review experience. We will be transitioning to a new journal management system, and as a result, we are introducing a revised Publication Fee. This is applicable to articles submitted on 1 Jan 2026 onwards, payable once the article is accepted for publication. The fee is according to the categories below:

- Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (AFPM) members = RM500
- Malaysian Family Medicine Specialists' Association (FMSA) members = RM500
- Non-AFPM/FMSA members (Malaysian) = RM800
- Non-AFPM/FMSA members (Non-Malaysian) = USD300

*The **Publication Fee** for article submitted from 1 Jan 2025 to 31 Dec 2025 are kept at:

- Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (AFPM) members = RM250
- Malaysian Family Medicine Specialists' Association (FMSA) members = RM250
- Non-AFPM/FMSA members (Malaysian) = RM450
- Non-AFPM/FMSA members (Non-Malaysian) = RM850

Corresponding Authors whose affiliations are in countries, areas, or territories on [Research4Life's Group A list](#) are eligible for a full Publication Fee waiver while those from [Research4Life's Group B list](#) may receive a 50% reduction of the Publication Fee. All fees are non-refundable.

Authors who have reviewed manuscripts for MFP within the past one year may enjoy a **waiver of the Submission and Publication Fees**. Only one article is waived for one article reviewed.

The publication fee was contributed by only 14 articles as many articles submitted in the second half of 2025 are pending publication.

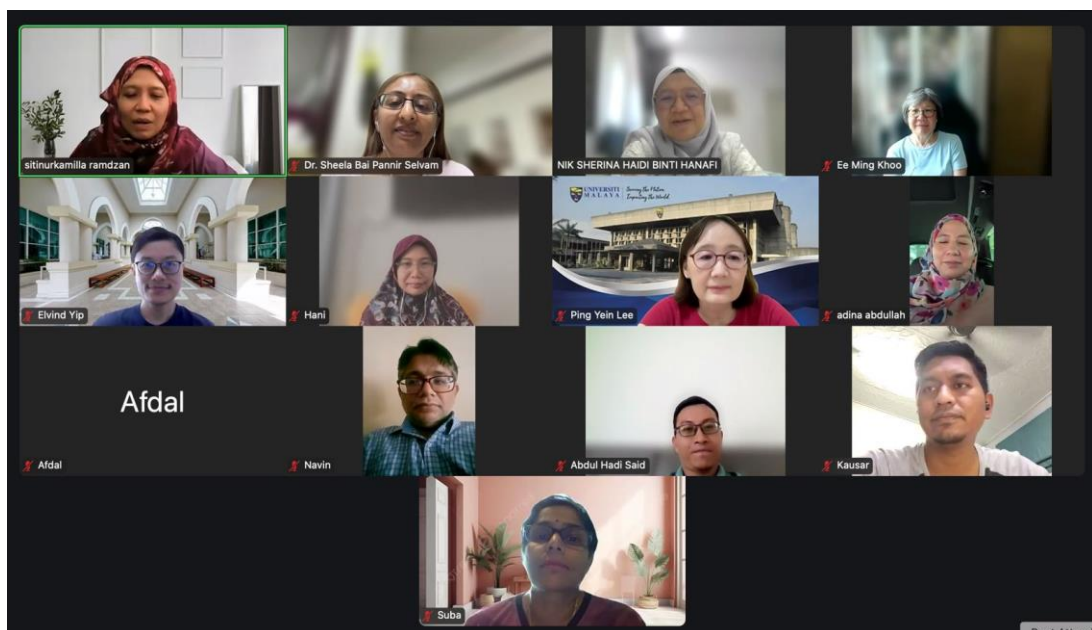

It places strong emphasis on enhancing research capacity, particularly among novice or budding researchers, and commonly features initiatives such as a Research Championship to encourage the development and refinement of high-quality research protocols.

The conference theme, “*Advancing Health through Innovations and AI*”, highlighted the growing role of technology in transforming healthcare delivery and research.

D) Strategic Meeting Planning

A strategic meeting was held on 18 October 2025 at Armada Hotel, Petaling Jaya, bringing together key leadership of the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (AFPM) and MPCRG committee. The meeting aimed at aligning committee members with EXCO and the Director of Advanced Training in Family Medicine (ATFM) on the direction and integration of research initiatives within the Academy's training and governance framework.

The discussion commenced with a focused deliberation on the Research Module and its alignment with the ATFM programme, emphasising the need for coherence, relevance, and strategic fit with current educational objectives following SSR, MQA and RACGP requirements. Participants exchanged views on strengthening research integration within training pathways to support evidence-based practice and capacity building among family physicians.

The meeting also served as an introductory platform for MPCRG to EXCO members. This session fostered a shared understanding of MPCRG's role, scope of activities, and ongoing efforts in advancing primary care research, as well as exploring potential areas for collaboration with the Academy's leadership and training arms.

Overall, the meeting reinforced strategic alignment between research, education, and governance, underscoring a collective commitment to enhancing research capacity and promoting effective collaboration among research, training, and leadership stakeholders within AFPM.

3.8. Annual Report of MOH Supervised Post Qualification Work Experience Posting Committee

A candidate who has successfully passed his/her Professional Examination and Training in the field of Family Medicine under the Parallel Pathways (non-MOH candidates) or those who hold the MRCGP and FRACGP postgraduate certificate need to undergo a period of supervised work attachment under supervision by a Family Medicine Specialist at a government health clinic i.e., Klinik Kesihatan before applying for registration as a Specialist in Family Medicine under the National Specialist Registry (NSR).

AFPM Credentialing committee has been given the mandate to take over this process from NSR since 2019. In 2025, the committee continued with online meetings and had 4 meeting (every three months) to vet new applications, to review logbook of candidates who had completed their posting and to discuss any issues pertaining to the MOH posting. A total of 13 new applications and 11 completed logbooks were approved. The 11 specialists had successfully completed their credentialing process and were issued the certificate of completion and will apply for NSR registration.

I. Adolescent Health Webinar

Held over two sessions on 29th November and 7th December 2025, the **"Between Screens & Scenes"** webinar series addressed the rising tide of school bullying, youth aggression, and body image issues.



As the first point of contact for many families, our primary care providers explored the critical intersection of adolescent psychological development and the digital era, guided by the expertise of Consultant Family Medicine Specialist Assoc. Prof. Dr. Noor Azimah Muhammad and Adolescent Paediatrician Dr Norita bt Mohamad Zin, who unpacked the intricate psychological drivers behind eating disorders.

The second half of the series delved into the "new frontiers" of adolescent health, tackling the sensitive realities of STIs, sexting, and social media's influence on sexual health. Led by specialized consultants in adolescent gynaecology and developmental paediatrics, including Dr Nik Sumayyah Nik Mohd Nor and Assoc Prof Dr Norazlin binti Kamal Nor, the sessions equipped attendees with the clinical tools needed to identify and manage the shift from simple bullying to physical brutality.

The 2025 calendar for the Chapter of Young Family Doctors (CoYFD) stands as a vibrant tapestry of connection and collective synergy. 3.10. Postgraduate Training in Family Medicine under Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (AFPM)

Annual Report of Quality Improvement Programme 2025

Background

The Quality Improvement Programme (QIP), established in 2018, is a formative workplace-based assessment designed to monitor and enhance clinical competencies of trainees in the Advanced Training in Family Medicine (ATFM) Years 1 and 2. Initially implemented virtually in 2021 due to the pandemic, QIP has now transitioned to face-to-face Practice Visits.

Its core components are Case-Based Discussions (CBD) which are conducted during monthly mentoring sessions using trainee logbooks, Practice Visits (Precepting) of direct observation of 4 clinical cases and GP Clinic Practice Assessment where the Practice Assessor evaluates suitability of clinics for specialist training accreditation. Beginning in 2024, all GP Practice Visits have been conducted face-to-face.

Each trainee undergoes one Practice Visit during ATFM Year 1 and Year 2. Wherever possible, the Practice Assessor is the trainee's mentor to ensure continuity in feedback, remediation, and progress tracking. The GP clinic Practice Assessment is conducted during the Year 1 Practice Visit, with reports submitted to the Board of Censors. Trainees are subsequently advised on any improvements required to meet accreditation standards for Family Medicine Specialist training.

Training for QIP Practice Assessors is conducted during the second day of the Mentor Training Workshop. Assessors are trained in conducting case-based discussions, precepting and direct observation, providing structured feedback and GP clinic accreditation processes.

Both trainees and Practice Assessors receive a formal briefing at the start of QIP Year 1 outlining the program structure, expectations, and standard operating procedures.

QIP Activities in 2025

- A total of 16 trainee mentors were trained as QIP Practice Assessors during the workshop held on 27 July 2025, bringing the cumulative number of trained Practice Assessors to 150.
- Intake 14 (Year 1 and Year 2) successfully completed their Practice Visits in 2025. All GP trainees underwent face-to-face Practice Visits, including GP clinic Practice Assessments to ensure suitability as accredited Family Medicine training facilities.
- **Collaborative Initiative:** QIP partnered with *Pertubuhan Doktor-Doktor Islam Malaysia (PERDIM)* to facilitate a two-day Hypertension Workshop on 2–3 August 2025 at Summit Hotel. The workshop utilised case scenarios based on national Hypertension Clinical Practice Guidelines and received positive feedback from participants.

Feedback

Feedback from both trainees and Practice Assessors has been consistently positive. The program's strength and impact lie in the emphasis on one-to-one direct observation and feedback, enabling individualised learning and targeted remediation and supporting continuous competency development in real practice settings.

Moving Forward

From 2026 onwards, the **Quality Improvement Programme (QIP) will be renamed as Workplace-Based Assessment (WBA)** to better reflect its role in formative assessment, structured feedback, and competency development. The WBA will come under the purview of the Chapter of Teachers, with Dr Loke Yean Yee appointed as the Person-in-Charge (PIC).

2025 AFPM-MMA Pahang Webinar Series Summary

Introduction In 2025, the AFPM Pahang Chapter successfully continued its strategic collaboration with MMA Pahang to deliver a series of five clinical webinars. These sessions were specifically designed to bridge the gap between primary and tertiary care, offering practical, evidence-based updates on common medical conditions encountered in daily general practice.

A. 2025 Webinar Schedule & Clinical Focus

The series covered a diverse range of specialties, including respiratory medicine, orthopaedics, geriatrics, and neurology.

B. Participation and Demographics

The webinar series saw strong engagement from the medical community, with a primary focus on AFPM members while maintaining multidisciplinary appeal.

- **Attendance Trends:** The highest recorded engagement occurred during the February session on respiratory management, which received **72 feedback responses**.
- **Member Representation:** AFPM members consistently formed most of the audience, ranging from **63.8% to 78.7%** of participants across all sessions.
- **Multidisciplinary Reach:** The collaboration also successfully engaged **MMA members, General Practitioners (GPs), Family Medicine Specialists (FMS/FMSA), and Medical Officers (MOs)**.

C. Performance Analysis & Participant Feedback

Participant feedback was overwhelmingly positive, emphasizing the high clinical relevance and practicality of the sessions.

- **High Satisfaction Levels:** A significant majority of participants rated the sessions as "Excellent" (5/5) in terms of satisfaction and helpfulness. For example, **86.1%** of respondents for the February webinar and **76.1%** for the October webinar gave top-tier satisfaction ratings.
- **Quality of Content:** Content was frequently described as "**Short, simple, and very informative**". Participants particularly appreciated the **practical approaches** that could be directly implemented in a primary care setting.
- **Effective Delivery:** Speakers were commended for their **clarity and concise presentations**, as well as their ability to handle complex Q&A sessions effectively.

D. Identified Areas for Growth

While the series was highly successful, participants offered suggestions to further enhance future learning experiences:

- **Technical Improvements:** Addressing minor audio issues like echoes.
- **Learning Resources:** A strong demand was noted for providing handouts, presentation slides, and recorded sessions for post-webinar reference.
- **Session Structure:** Some participants suggested including more case-based scenarios to simulate real-world clinic settings.

E. Future Directions

The feedback indicates a high demand for continued education in several key areas. Frequently requested topics for 2026 include:

- **Orthopaedics:** Knee OA management and osteoporosis.
- **Chronic Diseases:** Diabetes management during Ramadhan, Gout management, and Hypertension.
- **Specialized Care:** Women's health (menopause/menstrual issues), Dermatology in primary care, and Psychiatry (Adhd/Autism).

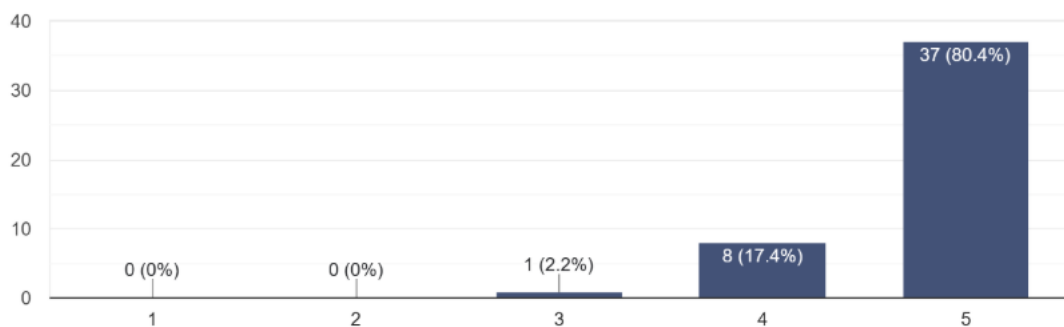
1. How satisfied were you with the PRACTICAL APPROACH IN DIZZINESS: DIAGNOSIS, TREATMENT AND REFERRAL?

4.3. Johor Section

1. Overview

The Johor Section continues to actively engage Family Medicine practitioners across the state through digital platforms, professional collaboration, and continuous medical education (CME) initiatives. Efforts have been focused on strengthening primary care networks, enhancing clinical knowledge sharing, and maintaining professional relevance amidst evolving healthcare challenges.

2. Communication & Professional Engagement

2.1. WhatsApp-Based GP Network

The Johor GP WhatsApp group remains a highly active and effective platform for:

- Rapid dissemination of AFPM announcements, CME updates, and policy communications
- Sharing of educational resources and clinical updates
- Facilitating real-time peer discussion and support among GPs

2.2. Clinical Case Discussions

- Active participation in patient case discussions
- Peer-to-peer consultation on complex cases
- Promotion of evidence-based practice and collaborative decision-making
- Particularly beneficial for younger and solo practitioners

2.3. CME Information Dissemination

- Regular sharing of CME programmes, webinars, and workshops
- Encouraging continuous professional development (CPD)
- Keeping GPs updated with evolving clinical guidelines

3. Key Challenges Faced by General Practitioners in Johor

The primary care ecosystem in Johor is facing increasing pressure from multiple fronts, affecting both sustainability and quality of care.

3.1. Rising Operational Costs

- Increasing rental, staffing, and utility costs
- Rising costs of medical supplies, medications, and compliance requirements
- Shrinking profit margins for independent GP clinics

3.2. Encroachment by Retail Pharmacies

- Dispensing of medications without valid prescriptions
- Management of chronic diseases without proper medical supervision
- Risks to patient safety and fragmentation of care
- Undermining the professional role of GPs

3.3. Price Undercutting by Pharmacies

- Sale of medications at prices below clinic cost
- Patients bypassing GP consultations purely based on cost comparison
- Increasing difficulty for clinics to remain competitive while maintaining quality care

3.4. Declining Patient Numbers and Income

- Reduced clinic attendance due to:
 - Changing patient behaviour
 - Economic pressures
 - Increased alternative access to medications
- Resulting in **declining revenue and sustainability concerns**

3.5. TPA (Third-Party Administrator) Pressures on GP Practice

- Increasing influence of TPAs in dictating clinical and operational aspects of GP practice
- **Low panel consultation fees** that are not in line with current cost of practice
- Restrictions on:
 - Medications prescribed
 - Investigations ordered
 - Duration of medical leave issued
- Administrative burden due to:
 - Pre-authorisation requirements
 - Claim documentation and rejection issues

There is growing concern that such practices:

- **Compromise clinical autonomy**
- Encourage **cost-driven rather than patient-centered care**
- Place GPs in a difficult position between patient needs and TPA limitations

3.6. Limitation of GP Scope to Reduce Costs

- Increasing pressure to minimise treatment costs at the expense of optimal care
- Limitation on:
 - Types of medications allowed
 - Diagnostic investigations
 - Referral pathways
- Risk of under-treatment or delayed diagnosis
- Potential medico-legal implications for GPs despite imposed restrictions

4. Impact on Primary Care

These cumulative challenges have resulted in:

- Reduced financial viability of GP clinics
- Increased practitioner stress and burnout
- Erosion of professional autonomy
- Potential compromise in quality, safety, and continuity of patient care
- Long-term threat to the sustainability of primary care services

5. Recommendations & Way Forward

5.1. Regulatory Strengthening

- Enforce clear boundaries between medical and pharmacy practice
- Strengthen oversight on prescription-only medications

5.2. Review of TPA Practices

- Advocate for:
 - Fair consultation fees aligned with current cost
 - Preservation of clinical autonomy
 - Reduction of unnecessary administrative burden
- Establish clearer guidelines on TPA involvement in clinical decisions

5.3. Public Awareness

- Educate patients on:
 - Importance of doctor-led care
 - Risks of bypassing proper medical consultation

5.4. Supporting GP Sustainability

- Policy advocacy to address rising operational costs
- Encourage collaboration and support networks among GPs

5.5. Continued CME & Engagement

- Sustain strong CME culture
- Promote digital engagement platforms
- Strengthen GP community and peer support systems

6. Conclusion

The Johor Section remains committed to advancing Family Medicine practice through active engagement, education, and advocacy. However, the increasing pressures from operational costs, non-regulated competition, and third-party administrative constraints highlight the urgent need for coordinated action to safeguard the future of primary care.

5. BUILDING – MEDICAL ACADEMIES

A) INTRODUCTION

Following the issuance of the Certificate of Completion and Compliance (CCC) on June 14, 2024, a meeting was convened at the request of Mr. Azan Azril from GDP Architects Sdn Bhd. The primary objectives of the meeting were:

- i. Formally hand over all necessary drawings and documents to the building owner, i.e., AMM & AFPM, for all records and future undertakings.
- ii. Briefing on defects and rectification processes and procedures.
- iii. Briefing on the additional ID and architectural works requested by the building owners.

As a result of this meeting, the Academies Building Management (ABM) was established to oversee and manage the operational, architectural, and maintenance needs of the building. The ABM committee comprises the following members. Dr Kaviyarsan Sailin was unanimously appointed as the Chairman of the ABM.

- Supporting fundraising initiatives
- Planning and executing future building upgrades

D) HAND OVER ALL DRAWINGS AND DOCUMENTS TO AMM & AFPM

A soft copy of the authorised drawings and documents in the form of a pen drive (4 Gigabytes) was handed officially by Mr Azan to Prof Dr Rosmawati Mohamed, AMM Master, and Dr Isriyanti Rafea, AFPM President. As written in his letter of 7th August 2024, the project completion hand drawings and documents handover list comprises the following:

E) DEFECTS AND RECTIFICATION PROCESSES

Mr. Azan informed that the Certificate of Practical Completion (CPC) was issued on 27th April 2024, and this was followed by the Certificate of Completion & Compliance (CCC) on 14th June 2024. Therefore, the defects liability period would be 12 months and will end on 15th May 2025. During this period, he would provide the defects liability and rectify all the defects.

Thereafter, the staff personnel from the KJ Management Property Sdn Bhd, who were engaged from 16th April 2024, had to carry out periodical physical management inspections. They will consolidate the defects/ complaints raised by the various tenants and channel them to the project consultants with copies to the contractors for follow-up within the contractual timelines.

The contractor, Pembinaan Teknikhas, is required to liaise with them and execute the rectification and maintenance of the defect with their supervision within the defect liability period. The contractor is also required to submit work records, photographs, and maintenance records of all work done. They will rectify it within 2 weeks unless it is a severe case, which will take more time.

F) ADDITIONAL ID & ARCHITECTURAL WORKS

During the walkabout with the BTF on 26th June 2024, there were a lot of additional ID works that needed to be done. All contract works were through the tender process.

This is located on the Ground Floor Lobby. It was proposed that the AMM and AFPM logos be installed at the top of the wooden panel above the screen, and this has been done.

- **Fibre Optic Connectivity for the Building**

Upon relocating to the new Academies Building in July 2024, the Academies and their tenants initially relied on five units of UNIFI dongles for temporary internet connectivity. Fibre optic cable installation was completed on 5th September 2024, and by December 2024, all occupants had successfully transitioned to UNIFI fibre connectivity. This upgrade has provided significantly faster and more reliable internet access throughout the building.

I) BO CHARGEMAN

Now that the Academies Building is registered with Suruhanjaya Tenaga (ST) and the defect liability period has ended, the Medical Academies is required to engage a dedicated chargeman. Furthermore, ST regulations mandate the appointment of a supervising engineer registered with ST to conduct biannual inspections of the electrical systems and submit reports accordingly.

Given the defined responsibilities of a chargeman, the ABM concluded that engaging a full-time BO Chargeman is not necessary at the moment. Instead, they requested Mr Muthiah Sundaram to assist in getting a part-time chargeman and a supervising engineer to ensure compliance with ST requirements. He has enquired from 5 companies but so far only 2 companies have responded:

The ABM selected RU Thiru Associates which offered the most competitive quote. The company commenced its services in June 2025.

Under this arrangement, the Chargeman will report to the Building Management and will be responsible for the operation, maintenance, and management of the building electrical equipment and systems. Meanwhile, the Supervising Engineer is required to submit a monthly report to Suruhanjaya Tenaga (ST) in accordance with regulatory requirements.

J) SOLAR PANELS

Due to the high usage of the electricity, which is averaging at RM32,000.00 per month, the Academies requested the help of our Building M & E Consultant, Mr Muthiah Sundaram to maximise the solar panels and to explore other vendors instead of going with TNB's overpriced proposal. After going through a tender process, SFS Energy was selected to supply and installation of additional solar panels on the roof of the Medical Academies Building.

The contractor has proposed 2 options. Option 1 avoids installation of PV panels on areas of the roof which are shaded at certain time of the day, while option 2 utilises the whole roof. Therefore, Option 1 is more efficient with a slightly shorter payback period. Listed below is a summary of their proposal.

The contractor has offered a discount of RM30,000.00. Therefore, the revised price for the 188.8KW peak Option 1 is RM385,000.00 as compared to the original price of RM415,000.00, which works out to be RM2,039.00 per KWp. Mr Muthiah Sundaram opined that this this is a reasonable price. During weekends when the chillers are not operating and the building is using very little energy the excess energy generated will be exported out to the grid.

The existing solar panels on the rooftop, with a capacity of approximately 40 to 50 kilowatts, were installed to meet the Green Building Index (GBI) requirements set by Putrajaya. Additional solar panels are now being installed on the metal decks located on the rooftop and Level 2 above the auditorium. Each panel weighs around 20 kg, resulting in a loading of only 10 kg per square meter - considered very light and within safe structural limits. The contractor assured that the installation of these additional panels would contribute to a noticeable reduction in electricity consumption. The installation was expected to take between 1.5 to 2 months to complete.

Following further discussions, the ABM agreed to proceed with Option 1 as quoted, and the agreement was signed on 24th February 2025. A site visit was conducted on 5th May 2025, and installation work commenced on 30th May 2025, after the conclusion of major events scheduled that month.

Installation was successfully completed on 11th July 2025. The project is now awaiting Suruhanjaya Tenaga (ST) application and Sustainable Energy Development Authority (SEDA) approval, which may take some time to process.

L) BUILDING ASSESSMENT

The Academies represented by the AMM Master, Prof Dr Rosmawati Mohamed and the then AFPM President, Dr Isriyanti Mohd Rafae had the opportunity to meet up with Encik Musa bin Mohamed who from Jabatan Akauntan, Bahagian Penilaian & Pesuruhjaya Bangunan (BPPB) on 24th March 2024. During the meeting, he highlighted the following key points:

- i. Six officers from BPPB conducted an on-site assessment of the Academies Building on 12th March 2025 for a new evaluation.
- ii. Previously, the assessment was based on the value of the vacant land. However, with the building now completed, it will be reassessed based on lettable space, excluding common areas.
- iii. As a result, the new assessment rate is expected to be higher even though the rate is still 8% based on the estimated annual value of the property.
- iv. Any revised rates will take effect in the second half of 2025 and will be reflected in the July 2025 billing cycle.
- v. The Academies may only submit an appeal after receiving the updated assessment bill within the designated time frame.
- vi. To strengthen the appeal, the Academies were advised to engage an independent land valuer to assess the building's value and include the valuation report with the appeal letter.

With the assistance of the AFPM Trustee, Dato' Dr Jaspal Singh Manocha has kindly helped to source some quotes for the property valuers and Khong & Jaafar quoted the lowest at RM27,000.00 for the valuation report.

An appeal letter along with the evaluation report was hand delivered and emailed to the Puan Siti Azzah Binti Abdul Razak, the Director of Assessment and Commissioner of Buildings Division Finance Department of PJC on 20th June 2025. The Academies are patiently waiting for PJC to be called for an interview.

M) FACADE LIGHTING

The PJC from Bahagian Kawalan Bangunan & Reka Bentuk Bandar, Jabatan Perancangan Bandar, convened a meeting with the Academies on Monday, 24th March 2025, at their office in Precinct 3, Putrajaya. The meeting was attended by AMM Master, Prof Dr Rosmawati Mohamed and the then AMM President, Dr Isriyanti Mohd Rafae were present. During the meeting, the PJC requested the Academies to adhere to the following external lighting schedule:

N) MOULD INFESTATION ON THE OAK VENEER WOOD

This issue has been long-standing, with numerous meetings and discussions held with the building consultants to reach a compromise. Several discussions were also conducted with the Chairman of the Building Task Force (BTF), who acted as a mediator in resolving the dispute regarding responsibility for the moulding and the cost of any necessary replacement.

On 3rd July 2025, GDP Architects submitted a letter to the Academies stating that, in their view, persistent high humidity on-site had significantly contributed to the mould growth. Based on this assessment, the main contractor has agreed to proceed with the full replacement of the affected veneer panels using artificial laminated panels. To facilitate this, the Academies have agreed to bear a maximum cost of RM5,000.00, with the remaining balance to be covered by the main contractor and the interior design (ID) sub-contractor. A detailed work program was also attached for reference.

The Academies, in a letter dated 10th July 2025, confirmed their agreement with the proposed work program and assured that the building management team would coordinate closely with all involved parties throughout the process.

As stated in Pembinaan Teknikhas' letter of 25th June 2025 and to facilitate this replacement, the Medical Academies will bear a maximum of RM5,000.00 towards the replacement cost.

However, the Medical Academies do not fully agree with Teknikhas assessment that the mould growth was caused by persistent high humidity on-site. This view contradicts the findings of the culture report prepared by our appointed specialist, Germguard Technologies (M) Sdn Bhd.

At this time, the replacement work has not yet commenced.

O) BUILDING FACILITIES

The updated rental rates for the function spaces, which were revised and finalized at the 11th ABM Meeting held on 9th May 2025, remain unchanged, emphasising that there is no half-day rate applicable:

P) UPDATES ON TENANTS' ISSUES

Currently, only three tenants are occupying the office spaces. Each tenant moved in at different times, and the tenancy term for all is three years, subject to renewal upon expiry.

- **Royal College of Surgeons Edinburgh (RCSEd)**

The RCSEd occupies an office space of 682 sq. ft at Level 3, Unit 3.10 of the Medical Academies Building. They were the first tenant to move in with their tenancy agreement commencing on 1st August 2024 and expiring on 31st July 2027.

- The rental is RM3,400 per month (680 sf x RM5.00 per sf)
- The maintenance bill is RM1,020.00 per month (680 sf x RM1.20 per sf)
- The cost of the robe cabinet interior design works, amounting to RM23,105.00, was fully borne by RCSEd

The 2nd tenant is PROGEN, occupying the office space of 700 sf (which is fully furnished) at Level 4, Unit 4.

The keys were handed over to PROGEN on 9th April 2025. However, the **3-year tenancy officially commenced on 1st April 2025** and is set to conclude on **31st March 2028**.

- **Malaysia-Ireland Training Programme for Family Medicine (MInTFM)**

MInTFM has taken up the office space of 1,200 sf at Level 4, Unit 4.2 for a 3-year term tenancy commencing 1st July 2025 and ending on 30th June 2028. The Tenancy Agreement was ceremoniously signed by both parties, Penang Medical College (PMC) and the Medical Academies, on 28th April 2025 at the AMM Meeting Room located at Level 3 of the Medical Academies Building.

- The rental is RM6,000.00 per month (1200 sf x RM5.00 per sf)
- The maintenance fee is RM1,440.00 per month (1200 x RM1.20 per sf)

On 4th April 2025, they have paid a total deposit of RM42,000.00 as follows. The keys were handed over to them on 23rd June 2025; to allow the tenant to carry out renovation works in preparation for occupancy.

- **Malaysian Society for Quality in Health (MSQH)**

The Malaysian Society for Quality in Health (MSQH), which had previously deferred its move-in, has since reversed its initial position and formally decided not to proceed with the lease or tenancy. This unexpected decision has resulted in significant financial losses and time wastage for the Academies.

Acting on instructions from the Academies, the law firm Skrine issued a formal letter to MSQH addressing both the proposed lease or tenancy and the interior design (ID) costs incurred in anticipation of the tenancy.

In response, via a letter dated 26th June 2025, MSQH's legal representatives, M Kumar & Associates, communicated that MSQH would not be taking up the space and requested a meeting to explore an amicable resolution to close the matter.

Subsequently, Skrine responded on 14th July 2025 to M Kumar & Associates and is currently awaiting a reply.

- **Majlis Dekan Perubatan Universiti Awam (MEDAC Sdn Bhd)**

On 14th April 2025, MEDAC submitted a Letter of Intent expressing interest in renting office space on Level 3, with a total area of 716 square feet.

A site visit was conducted on 5th June 2025, attended by Dr Kaviyaran Sallin, Chairman of the Academies Building Management (ABM).

A follow-up reminder was sent to MEDAC on 16th July 2025, requesting an update on their tenancy decision.

With MEDAC having taken up office space, there is now only one vacant office unit available on Level 4, measuring 600 square feet, available for rental.

Q) LEASE AGREEMENTS

Following a strategic decision by the Academies to switch from selling to leasing office spaces, a special lease agreement was structured to accommodate this new direction. Under this arrangement, the following terms apply:

Parties Expressing Interest:

Three societies have expressed formal interest in leasing office spaces under this special arrangement. It has been communicated to all prospective lessees that they will bear full responsibility for costs related to:

- a. Architectural works
- b. Interior Design (ID)
- c. Mechanical & Electrical (M&E) works

Progress on Lease Agreements with Medical Societies

On 23rd April 2025, the Academies formally issued a letter to three societies, urging them to confirm their decision and agreement to proceed with the lease arrangements as set out in the Seventh Revision of the Lease Agreement 2025. The societies were requested to respond by 30th June 2025

The letter highlighted two key points:

- a) Prolonged negotiations or repeated legal consultations may result in additional legal fees.
- b) A timely resolution is essential, as rental collection is scheduled to begin on 1st July 2025.

Response from Malaysian Orthopaedic Association (MOA)

The Malaysian Orthopaedic Association (MOA) has responded, indicating that additional time is required for its legal team to complete the review of the lease agreement. In the interim, MOA is open to a short-term rental arrangement, which would allow rental payments to begin as scheduled on 1st July 2025, while the long-term lease is being finalized and executed.

Preparation of Lease Agreements

As of 14th July 2025, the law firm Skrine has been instructed to prepare specific lease agreements for the following leases:

- a) Malaysian Society of Gastroenterology & Hepatology (MSGH)
- b) Malaysian Society of Colorectal Surgeons (MSCRS)

R) UTILISATION OF OFFICE SPACE

The table below shows the overall office space for renting and leasing. There is about 18,000 sq. ft that contributes to the maintenance fees and therefore more income is needed for the sustainability of the building.

S) CERTIFICATE OF MAKING GOOD DEFECTS (CMGD)

On 4th June 2025, GDP Architects issued the Certificate of Making Good Defects (CMGD) following confirmation from the main contractor, Pembinaan Teknikhas, that all identified defects have been satisfactorily rectified. Accordingly, in line with the provisions of the contract, the Completion of Making Good Defects shall be deemed to have taken place on 15th May 2025, for all contractual purposes.

T) FORMATION OF SDN BHD

Following extensive discussions, both the AMM and AFPM have agreed to the formation of a new company. Previously, the AMM did not agree to the establishment of an Sdn Bhd due to its tax-exempt status. Additionally, under Section 44(6), AMM is restricted from owning more than 49% of an Sdn Bhd. With AMM's proposed ownership at 66.67%, this would contravene IRB guidelines. While this poses a compliance issue for AMM, there are no such restrictions for AFPM.

If the Sdn Bhd is established, all transactions would be managed through the new entity, with dividends distributed in the same proportion - two-thirds (66.67%) to AMM and one-third (33.33%) to AFPM.

Furthermore, with the formation of the new company, E-invoicing compliance should no longer be a concern.

As informed by the accountant from Heritage Accounting Services, the latest announcement by the Ministry of Finance on 27th June 2025 states that tenants classified as Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) with an annual turnover of less than RM1,000,000 are exempted from Service Tax on rental and leasing services. The accountant has confirmed the following revenue streams for JADF:

- a) Rental of office premises
- b) Rental of building facilities (e.g., auditoriums, halls)
- c) Maintenance fees

At present, JADF's total revenue has not yet reached RM1,000,000, as the office premises are still not fully occupied

6. WONCA Report 2025

WONCA World Conference 2025 — Lisbon, Portugal

17–21 September 2025

a. Event Summary

The 25th WONCA World Conference took place in Lisbon, Portugal, at the Lisbon Congress Centre, gathering family doctors and primary care professionals from over 117 countries. More than 4,000 delegates attended scientific sessions, workshops, plenaries, and networking events.

b. Venue — Lisbon Congress Centre

The Lisbon Congress Centre (CCL) served as the main hub for the conference. It is a large, modern venue beside the Tagus River in the historic Belém district.

c. Delegates, Countries & Audience Demographics

The conference drew delegates from 117+ countries, including:

- Experienced family physicians and academics
- Young doctors and trainees
- Health policymakers and system planners
- Interdisciplinary healthcare professionals

The rich international representation supported cross-cultural sharing of best practices, research findings, and primary care innovations.

d. Election of the New WONCA President and Executive

A highlight of the Conference was the election and inauguration of the new WONCA President and related leadership positions during the WONCA World Council Meeting:

New President

- Dr Viviana Martinez-Bianchi (USA/Argentina) was formally installed as President of the World Organization of Family Doctors on 20 September 2025 at the Awards & Inauguration Ceremony.
 - ❖ She had been elected President - Elect in 2023 and with this inauguration, began her presidency term for 2025–2027.
 - ❖ Dr Martinez-Bianchi is the first person from Latin America elected as WONCA President and the first woman from the Americas to hold this office, marking a significant milestone for geographic and gender representation.

e. Keynote Speakers & Key Messages

The conference featured eminent international speakers delivering plenaries and keynote lectures. Highlights included:

Hub Speeches

- **Prof Dr Karen Flegg (WONCA President):** *Primary health care and sustainable development* — emphasised the centrality of primary care in health systems strengthening.
- **Dr Şeyma Handan Akyön (Turkey):** *Family medicine and AI — a human touch* — explored how AI can support clinicians without diminishing the doctor-patient relationship.
- **Dr Hans Henri P. Kluge (WHO Regional Director for Europe):** *Future of health & wellbeing* — tied family medicine leadership to equitable care futures.
- **Dr Jim Campbell (WHO Health Workforce):** *Accelerating action on the health workforce by 2030* — workforce retention and training priorities.
- **Dr Richard G. Roberts:** *Human factors science* — putting people at the core of healthcare.
- **Dr Andrée Rochfort:** *Revisiting the quadruple aim* — clinician wellbeing and system performance.
- **Prof Dr Tracey Naledi:** *More than medicine: community advocacy* — the social determinants of health and community engagement.
- **Dr Viviana Martinez-Bianchi (incoming WONCA President):** *Digital age family medicine* — leveraging technology thoughtfully.
- **Dr Mary McCarthy:** *The best job in medicine* — reaffirming the rewards of family practice.

Takeaway messages struck recurrent themes:

- Primary care is the foundation of resilient health systems
- Balancing technological innovation (like AI) with humanism and equity
- Workforce sustainability, wellbeing, and training
- Community engagement and advocacy
- Global collaboration and shared learning

f. Importance of AI and Innovation Workshops

AI was a significant and recurring topic, reflecting its growing influence on clinical practice and health systems. The discussions were framed around how to blend humanism with technology to create value in healthcare.

- **Dedicated Sessions:** The program included keynote lectures and sessions specifically on the intersection of Family Medicine and emerging technology, such as:
 - ❖ "Family Medicine and Artificial Intelligence - A Human Touch."
 - ❖ Lectures on the "Rational use of technology in family medicine."
 - ❖ A session titled "Harnessing AI for smarter research and sustainable healthcare: Enhancing research in family medicine."
 - ❖ Practical insights into AI-supported clinical documentation and workflow
 - ❖ Discussions on ethical and regulatory aspects of AI in family medicine
 - ❖ Real-world case presentations on AI's role in patient safety and continuity of care

These sessions emphasized that AI should empower clinicians to deliver more personalized, efficient care while safeguarding the doctor-patient relationship.

g. Other Workshop Highlights

Beyond AI, the conference included numerous skill-building and knowledge-sharing workshops on topics such as:

- Evidence-based approaches to behavioural change and chronic disease management
- Patient-focused communication and motivational interviewing
- Community health promotion and social determinants of health
- Practice-based research and poster presentations

h. Leads Generated & Networking Outcomes

Malaysian delegates and other attendees reported:

- New international research collaborations, especially in digital health and quality improvement
- Opportunities for future joint workshops and shared care initiatives
- Strong engagement with YDM (Young Doctors' Movement) leaders and mentorship possibilities
- Contacts with global policy advocates and regional presidents for future leadership pathways

These connections provide momentum to elevate Malaysian family medicine on the global stage.

Among our key achievements this year:

- On 6th July 2025, the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (AFPM), together with the Family Medicine Specialists' Association (FMSA), Klinik As-Salam, Salam Edumed, and Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM), successfully organized the **World Family Doctor Day's FIT CPR Run 2025** at the Medical Academies of Malaysia, Putrajaya, in conjunction with World Family Doctor Day. Dr. Ismuni Bohari, Deputy Director-General of Health (Public Health), Ministry of Health Malaysia; and YBhg. Dato' Dr. Hajjah Norsiah Ali, Director of the Family Health Development Division, Ministry of Health Malaysia.





- Successful collaborative effort to tackle hypertension - A two-day seminar and workshop on the **Clinical Practice Guidelines (CPG) for the Management of Hypertension** was held on 2nd and 3rd August 2025 at Royale Chulan Damansara - a collaboration between PERDIM, Universiti Teknologi MARA (UiTM), the Malaysian Medical Association (MMA), and the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (AFPM). 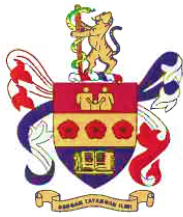

RESOLUTION FOR COUNCIL APPROVAL

Proposal to Add a New Constitutional Clause on the Ethical and Effective Integration of Artificial Intelligence and Digital Innovation in AFPM's education, training, practice, and research.

1. PURPOSE

The purpose is to seek the Council's approval to table a constitutional amendment at the upcoming Annual General Meeting (AGM), proposing the addition of a new clause addressing the **ethical, equitable, and effective integration of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and digital innovation into Primary Care education, training, practice, and research.**

2. BACKGROUND

The College of General Practitioners of Malaysia was founded in 1973 with the mission:

1. To improve the health and well-being of individuals, families, and communities in Malaysia; and
2. To support members in their pursuit of clinical excellence.

The current Vision states:

"To promote high-quality clinical practice, education, and research in Malaysian General Practice."

While these founding statements remain relevant, they do not explicitly address the rapid technological developments shaping healthcare in the era of IR4.0, including Artificial Intelligence, digital health, data science, automation, and emerging innovations in medical education.

Globally, leading medical colleges and academies have begun integrating AI literacy, guidelines, and ethical principles into training and practice. As the oldest organisation representing General Practitioners and Primary Care Physicians in Malaysia, the Academy must demonstrate leadership in preparing its members for technology-enabled, patient-centred care.

3. JUSTIFICATION

3.1 Relevance to Current Healthcare Landscape

AI and digital technologies are increasingly influencing:

- Clinical decision support
- Diagnostics
- Chronic disease management
- Patient engagement
- Population health
- Medical education and CPD

The Academy must provide guidance to ensure these tools are used ethically, equitably, and safely.

3.2 Future-Proofing the Academy

Without explicit mention of digital innovation or AI in the Constitution, future program development may lack direction or clarity. Incorporating AI within the constitutional Vision provides a strategic anchor for the next decade.

3.3 Alignment with International Standards

Professional bodies and WONCA have begun outlining competencies for AI-enabled practice. The Academy must maintain global relevance and credibility.

3.4 Member Expectations

New members and trainees expect the Academy to lead conversations on technological transformation and to provide structured AI education integrated with compassion, competence, and professionalism.

4. PROPOSED AMENDMENT

It is proposed that the following clause be added under the section **Vision** of the Constitution (as per its existing structure):

“To advance the ethical, equitable, and effective use of Artificial Intelligence and digital innovation in Primary Care education, training, practice, and research, ensuring family doctors remain compassionate, competent, and socially accountable practitioners.”

This clause will be inserted as the next sequential subsection under the Vision.

5. IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

If approved by Council:

1. The amendment will be tabled at the upcoming AGM as a formal resolution.
2. Upon approval by a two-thirds majority at the AGM, the amendment will be submitted to:
 - o **Registrar of Societies (ROS)** for formal approval.
3. Following ROS approval:
 - o The updated Constitution will be circulated to members.
 - o The Academy's strategic plan, website, and educational frameworks will be aligned with the new clause.
 - o AI competency programmes and ethical guidelines may be developed under the Education & Training Committee.

6. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The amendment itself has **minimal financial impact**.

Future initiatives (e.g., AI literacy workshops, digital platforms) will require separate budget approvals depending on scope and scale.

7. DECISION REQUIRED

Council is requested to approve the following:

“That the Council endorses the proposed addition of a new constitutional clause on, to advance the ethical, equitable, and effective use of Artificial Intelligence and digital innovation in Primary Care education, training, practice, and research, ensuring family doctors remain compassionate, competent, and socially accountable practitioners.”

RESOLUTION TO AMEND THE TERM STRUCTURE OF THE PRESIDENT AND PRESIDENT-ELECT IN THE CONSTITUTION

A. Background

The current Constitution of the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia, under Article 8 Council of The Academy, provides for a one-year term each for the President and President-Elect by virtue of the annual election. The Immediate Past President is also listed under the constitution as an appointed EXCO Bearer, serving another one-year term. While this structure ensures leadership rotation, it limits continuity, strategic planning, and effective implementation of initiatives.

To strengthen governance, enhance leadership effectiveness, and improve organisational stability, it is proposed that the presidential term structure be revised.

B. Insertion of New Clause(s):

The Constitution shall instead provide that:

The President-Elect shall serve a term of two (2) years;

Upon completion of this term, the President-Elect shall automatically assume the office of President for a term of two (2) years;

There shall be no mandatory term for an Immediate Past President following completion of the presidential term, unless otherwise appointed or elected to another office in accordance with the Constitution.

Transitional Provisions (if applicable):

Any necessary transitional arrangements to implement this amendment shall be determined by the Executive Committee / Council to ensure continuity and fairness, as agreed upon by the members voting on this resolution at the Annual General Meeting.

ii) Improved Policy Implementation and Continuity

A two-year presidential term allows initiatives, reforms, and projects to be fully implemented and evaluated, reducing disruption caused by frequent leadership changes.

iii) Stronger Leadership Development

A two-year President-Elect term allows deeper understanding of organisational operations, challenges, and stakeholder engagement before assuming the presidency.

iv) Greater Accountability and Measurable Outcomes

Extended terms enable clearer performance assessment, as office-holders have adequate time to demonstrate results and see initiatives through to completion.

v) Reduced Administrative and Transition Burden

Fewer leadership transitions reduce administrative workload, handover inefficiencies, and loss of institutional knowledge.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2025

1. SOCIETY INFORMATION

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the Council of The Academy (The Council) in accordance with a resolution of the Council on 18 March 2026.

The principal place of business of the Academy is at Unit 3.11, Level 3, Medical Academies Malaysia Building, 5, Jalan P8H, Presint 8, 62250 Putrajaya, Wilayah Persekutuan Putrajaya.

The principal activity of the Academy is to provide courses, promote and maintain high standard among general medical practitioners.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Academy have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise indicated in this summary of significant accounting policies. The financial statements comply with the applicable Malaysian Private Entity Reporting Standards and the provisions of the Societies Act, 1966 in Malaysia.

b) Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

i) Recognition and measurement

Property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment loss.

Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. The cost of self-constructed assets includes the cost of materials and direct labour, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the working condition for its intended use, and the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located. When parts of an item of property, plant, and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

ii) Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the Academy and its cost can be measured reliably. The costs of the day-to-day servicing of the property, plant, and equipment are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as incurred.

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)**b) Property, plant and equipment and depreciation (Continued)****iii) Disposal**

Gain or loss arising on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined by comparing the net disposal proceed with the carrying amount of property, plant and equipment and is recognised net within other income in the statement of comprehensive income on the date of disposal.

iv) Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated over the depreciable amount, which is the cost of an asset, or other amount substituted for cost, less its residual value.

Property, plant and equipment under construction are not depreciated. Depreciation on other property, plant and equipment is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income on the reducing balance basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of property, plant and equipment, since this most closely reflects the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the asset.

The annual rates used for this purpose are as follows:

Freehold Building	1%
Furniture & Fittings	10%
Office Equipment	10%
Computers, Printers & Software	10% - 30%
Teaching Aids & Equipment	10%

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed, and adjusted as appropriate, at each reporting date.

c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash represents cash and bank balances. Cash equivalents comprise items which are readily convertible to cash with insignificant risk of change in value. For the purposes of the cash flow statements, cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and at bank, demand deposits and short-term highly liquid investments which have an insignificant risk of changes in value.

d) Financial instruments**i) Loan and Receivables**

Loan and receivables are financial assets with fixed or determined payments that are not quoted in an active market. Such assets include the Academy's trade receivables, other receivables, as well as cash and cash equivalents.

The assets are recognised at cost plus any directly attributable transaction costs.

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

d) Financial instruments (Continued)

ii) Other financial liabilities

The Academy's other financial liabilities include trade payables, sundry payables and accruals, term loans and amount due to related Academy.

Such financial liabilities are recognised at cost plus any directly attributable transaction costs.

e) Provisions for liabilities

Provisions are recognised when the Academy has a present legal and constructive obligation as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

f) Impairment of assets

i) Financial assets (including receivables)

A financial asset is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial assets is impaired if objective evidence indicates that a loss event has occurred after the initial recognition of the assets, and that the loss event had a negative effect on the estimated future cash flows of that assets that can be estimated reliably.

Objective evidence that financial assets are impaired include (although not limited to) the following events: default or delinquency by a debtor, restructuring of an amount due to the Academy on terms that the Academy would not consider otherwise, indications that a debtor or issuer will enter bankruptcy, and the disappearance of an active market for the security.

Financial assets are generally assessed for impairment on an individual basis. However, for certain categorise of financial assets, such as trade receivables, assets that are assessed not to be impaired individually are subsequently assessed for impairment on a collective basis based on similar risk characteristics.

Objective evidence of impairment for a portfolio of receivables could include the Academy's past experience of collecting payments, an increase in the number of delayed payments in the portfolio past the average credit period and observable changes in national or localeconomic conditions that correlate with default on receivables.

All impairment losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)**f) Impairment of assets (Continued)****ii) Non-financial assets**

The carrying amounts of the Academy's non-financial assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, the assets recoverable amounts are estimated.

An impairment loss is charged to the statement of comprehensive income in the period in which it arises, unless the asset is carried at revalued amount. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is recognised directly against the revaluation surplus account for that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount held in the revaluation surplus account.

Impairment losses recognised in prior years are assessed at each reporting date for any indications that the loss has decreased or no longer exists. An impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates use to determine the recoverable amount. An impairment loss is reversed to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised. Reversals of impairment losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

g) Employee benefits**i) Short term benefits**

Wages, salaries, paid annual leave and sick leave, bonuses, and non-monetary benefits are accrued in the financial year in which the associated services are rendered by employees of the Academy.

ii) Defined contribution plans

The Academy makes contributions to the Employees Provident Fund in Malaysia, a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions to the defined contribution pension scheme are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related services are performed.

h) Revenue recognition

The Academy includes in revenue only the gross inflows of economic benefits received and receivable by the Academy. The amounts collected on behalf of third parties such as sales taxes, goods and services taxes and value added taxes are excluded from revenue.

- i. Revenue from services is recognised when:
 - a) it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Academy;
 - b) the costs incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be measured reliably; and
 - c) upon the delivery of services and acceptance by customers.
- ii. Interest Income

Interest income on fixed deposits is recognised on accrual basis.

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)**h) Revenue recognition (Continued)**

- iii. Rental income
Rental income is recognised on an accrual basis in accordance with the substance of the relevant agreement.
- iv. Subscription Fee
Subscription fee is recognised on receipt basis.
- v. Enrolment Fees
Enrolment fee is recognised on receipt basis.
- vi. Life Membership Fee
Life membership fee is recognised on receipt basis.
- vii. Income from Joint Venture (JADF)
The share of the profits from the Joint Venture is based on the agreed profit-sharing ratio of 1/3:2/3 between the Academy and the other joint venturer, respectively.

i) Income tax**i) Current tax**

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Current taxes are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income except to the extent that the tax relates to items recognised outside profit or loss, either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

ii) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences at the reporting date between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except where the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses, to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised except where the deferred tax asset relating to the deductible temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)**i) Income tax (continued)****ii) Deferred tax (continued)**

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax assets to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are reassessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profit will allow the deferred tax assets to be utilised.

j) Basis of Consolidation**i) Subsidiaries**

Subsidiaries are all entities (including special purpose entities) over which the Academy has control. The Academy controls an entity when the Academy is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the relevant activities of the entity. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Academy. They are deconsolidated from the date that control ceases.

The Group applies the acquisition method to account for business combinations. The consideration transferred for the acquisition of a subsidiary is the fair values of the assets transferred, the liabilities incurred to the former owners of the acquiree and the equity interests issued by the Group. The consideration transferred includes the fair value of any asset or liability resulting from a contingent consideration arrangement and fair value of any pre-existing equity interest in the subsidiary. Identifiable assets acquired and liabilities and contingent liabilities assumed in business combination are, with limited exceptions, measured initially at their fair values at the acquisition date. The Group recognises any non-controlling interest in the acquiree on an acquisition-by-acquisition basis, either at fair value or at the non-controlling interest's proportionate share of the recognised amounts of acquiree's identifiable net assets.

Acquisition-related costs are expensed as incurred.

If the business combination is achieved in stages, the carrying value of the acquirer's previously held equity interest in the acquiree is remeasured to fair value at the acquisition date and any corresponding gain or loss is recognised in the profit or loss.

Any contingent consideration to be transferred by the Group is recognised at fair value at the acquisition date. Subsequent changes to the fair value of the contingent consideration that is deemed to be an asset or liability is recognised in profit or loss. Contingent consideration that is classified as equity is not remeasured, and its subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity.

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)**j) Basis of Consolidation (continued)****i) Subsidiaries (continued)**

Goodwill is initially measured as the excess of the aggregate of the consideration transferred, the amount of any non-controlling interest and the fair value of any previous equity interest in the acquiree at the acquisition date over the fair value of the net identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed. If the total consideration transferred, non-controlling interest recognised and previously held interest measured is less than the fair value of the net assets of the subsidiary acquired, the difference is recognised directly in the profit or loss as a gain on bargain purchase.

ii) Changes in ownership interests in subsidiaries without change of control

Transactions with non-controlling interests that do not result in loss of control are accounted for as equity transactions – that is, as transactions with the owners in their capacity as owners of the Group. A change in ownership interest results in an adjustment between the carrying amounts of the controlling and noncontrolling interests to reflect their relative interests in the subsidiary. The difference between fair value of any consideration paid and the relevant share acquired of the carrying value of net assets of the subsidiary is recorded in equity. Gains or losses on disposals to noncontrolling interests are also recorded in equity.

iii) Disposal of subsidiaries

When the Group ceases to have control, any retained interest in the entity is re-measured to its fair value at the date when control is lost, with the change in carrying amount recognised in profit or loss. The fair value is the initial carrying amount for the purposes of subsequently accounting for the retained interest as an associate, joint venture or financial asset. In addition, any amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income (“OCI”) in respect of that entity are accounted for as if the Group had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities. This means that amounts previously recognised in OCI are reclassified to the profit or loss. Gains or losses on the disposal of subsidiaries include the carrying amount of goodwill relating to the subsidiaries sold.

k) Investment in Subsidiaries

A subsidiary is an entity in which the Academy has power to exercise control over the financial and operating policies so as to obtain benefits from its activities. In assessing control, potential voting rights that presently are exercisable are taken into account.

The investment in subsidiary companies is accounted at cost less impairment losses. On disposal of such investments, the difference between net disposal proceeds and their carrying amounts are included in the profit or loss.

The policy for the recognition and measurement of impairment losses is in accordance with Note 2 (f).

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2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

l) Interest in Joint-Ventures (JADF)

The Academy had entered a joint venture with the Academy of Medicine of Malaysia, the College of Surgeons of Malaysia and College of Physicians for the purpose of undertaking the purchase or acquisition of any land and/or building and/or construction of an academic building on behalf of the parties to the said joint venture. The joint venture is an unincorporated entity and is referred to as the Joint Academies Development Fund (hereinafter referred to as “the JADF”). The Academy has a 33.33% (1/3) interest in the said joint venture.

The Academy Medical Colleges is the custodian of monies attributable to the Academy in respect of the accounts of the joint venture, the JADF.

The interest in joint venture, the JADF is accounted for using the equity method of accounting. The equity investment in the JADF is initially recognised at the transaction price (including transaction costs) and is subsequently adjusted to reflect the Academy's share of the profit or loss and other comprehensive income of the JADF.

The construction of the academic building undertaken by the JADF was completed and the Certificate of Completion and Compliance (“CCC”) was obtained on 14 June 2024.

3. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The preparation of the Academy's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the reporting date. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the assets or liability affected in the future.

(i) Estimated Useful Lives of Property, Plant and Equipment

The Academy reviews annually the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment based on factors such as business plans and strategies, expected level of usage and future technological developments. Future results of operations could be materially affected by changes in these estimates brought about by changes in the factors mentioned. A reduction in the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment would increase the recorded depreciation and decreases the net book value of property, plant and equipment.

(ii) Impairment of Receivable

The Academy assesses at each reporting date whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset is impaired. To determine whether there is objective evidence of impairment, the Academy considers factors such as the probability of insolvency or significant financial difficulties of the debtor and default or significant delay in payments.

Report on the Financial Statements

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of THE ACADEMY OF FAMILY PHYSICIANS OF MALAYSIA (hereinafter referred to as "the Academy"), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2025, and the statement of comprehensive income and retained earnings and statement of cash flow, for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* section of our report, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Academy as at 31 December 2025, and of its financial performance and its cash flow for the year then ended in accordance with Malaysian Private Entities Reporting Standards and the requirement of the Societies Act in Malaysia.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

We refer to Note 2(l) to the financial statements stating that the interest in the joint venture JADF is accounted using the equity method of accounting although the building undertake by the JADF was completed by 14 June 2024. We also refer to Note 23 to the financial statements in respect of the joint venture, JADF stating that although the construction of the Medical Academies Building was completed in June 2024, at the date of report, the JADF is still in the process of finalising and closing its accounts, and its financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2025. The Academy's share of results and equity interest in JADF for the financial year ended 31 December 2025 has been recognised based on financial information prepared by the management of the JADF. We refer to Note 6 to the financial statements stating, the carrying amount of the Academy's investment in the JADF is calculated based on the unaudited financial statements of the JADF as at 31 December 2025. In the absence of finalised and audited financial statements of JADF, we were unable to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to determine whether any adjustments to the amounts recognised are necessary. Accordingly, there is a risk that these amounts may be materially misstated.

We conducted our audit in accordance with approved standards on auditing in Malaysia and International Standards on Auditing. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Accordingly, we are unable to conclude whether or not the financial statements is materially misstated with respect to this matter. Our opinion on the financial statements of the Academy does not cover the Council’s Report and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Council’s Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Council of the Academy is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Malaysian Private Entity Reporting Standards and the Societies Act in Malaysia and for such internal controls as the Council determines are necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements of the Academy, the Council is responsible for assessing the Academy’s ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Council either intend to liquidate the Academy or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

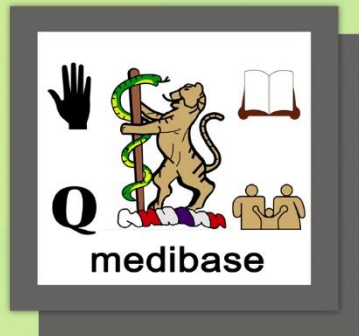

**NOTE TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2025**

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

The Company is a private limited company incorporated and domiciled in Malaysia.

The registered office is located at 8A, Jalan Vivekananda Brickfields 50470 Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

The principal place of business is located at Unit 3.11, Level 3, Medical Academies Malaysia Building, No. 5, Jalan P8H, Presint 8, 62250 Putrajaya, Wilayah Persekutuan Putrajaya Malaysia.

The principal activities of the Company are providing support to The Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (the holding entity) in the courses and training to general medical practitioners. There have been no significant changes in the nature of the activities during the financial year.

The financial statements of the Company are presented in Ringgit Malaysia (“RM”), which is the functional currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Malaysian Private Entities Reporting Standard (“MPERS”) and the requirements of the Companies Act, 2016 in Malaysia.

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared under the historical cost convention except as otherwise stated in the financial statements.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MPERS requires the directors to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses and disclosure of contingent assets and contingent liabilities. In addition, the directors are also required to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the accounting policies. The areas involving such judgements, estimates and assumptions are disclosed in Note 5 to the financial statements. Although these estimates and assumptions are based on the directors’ best knowledge of events and actions, actual results could differ from those estimates.

3. DATE OF AUTHORISATION OF ISSUE

The financial statements of the Company were authorised for issue by the Board of Directors on 2 March 2026.

4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to the periods presented in these financial statements and have been applied consistently by the Company, unless otherwise stated.

a. PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

All items of property, plant and equipment are initially measured at cost. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when the cost is incurred and it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the asset would flow to the Company and the cost of the asset could be measured reliably. The carrying amount of parts that are replaced is derecognised. Cost also comprises the initial estimate of dismantling and removing the asset and restoring the site on which it is located for which the Company is obligated to incur when the asset is acquired, if applicable.

For major component of an item of property, plant and equipment which have significantly different patterns of consumption of economic benefits, the initial cost of the asset shall be allocated to its major components and depreciate each such component separately over its useful life.

After initial recognition, property, plant and equipment except for freehold land are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Except for freehold land and properties under construction which are not depreciated, depreciation is provided on a straight-line method so as to write off the depreciable amount of the following assets over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

Teaching Aids and Equipment	20%
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Depreciation of an asset begins when it is ready for its intended use.

If there is an indication of a change in factors affecting the residual value, useful life or asset's depreciation method since the last annual reporting date, the residual values, depreciation method and useful lives of depreciable assets are reviewed, and the changes are accounted for as a change in an accounting estimate and adjusted prospectively.

The carrying amounts of items of property, plant and equipment are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from their use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising from the derecognition of items of property, plant and equipment, determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amounts of the item, is recognised in profit or loss.

b. IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS

At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether there is any indication that an asset (excluding investments in subsidiaries and associates, deferred tax assets, investment properties measured at fair value) may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

b. Impairment of non-financial assets (continued)

When there is an indication that an asset may be impaired but it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of the individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

The recoverable amount of an asset and a cash-generating unit is the higher of the fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the future cash flow estimates have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset or a cash-generating unit is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised to reduce the carrying amount to its recoverable amount.

The impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately.

All assets that suffered impairment loss are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at each reporting date. An impairment loss is reversed to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation, if no impairment loss had been recognised in prior periods. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

c. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Financial instruments are recognised on the statement of financial position when the Company has become a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. At initial recognition, a financial instrument is recognised at transaction price, including transaction costs if the financial instrument is not measured at fair value through profit or loss, except a financing transaction. Financing transactions are measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Basic financial instruments include cash, debt instruments (receivables and payables), commitments to receive loans that cannot be settled net in cash, investments in non-convertible preference shares and non-puttable ordinary or preference shares.

i. Financial Instruments that are Debt Instruments measured at Amortised Cost

At the end of each reporting period, an entity shall measure financial instruments as follows, without any deduction for transaction costs the entity may incur on sale or other disposal.

Subsequent to initial recognition, debt instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, whilst commitments to receive a loan are measured at cost less impairment.

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4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

c. Financial instruments (continued)

i. Financial Instruments that are Debt Instruments measured at Amortised Cost (continued)

Effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of financial assets and of allocating the interest income over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimate future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial assets or, when appropriate, a shorter period, to the carrying amount of the financial assets.

A financial asset is derecognised when the contractual right to receive cash flows from the financial asset has expired or settled.

ii. Financial Assets at Fair Value through Profit or Loss

Financial assets are classified as at fair value through profit or loss when the financial assets are within the scope of Section 12 of the MPERS or if the financial assets are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably without undue cost or effort.

Changes in fair value are recognised in profit or loss.

If a reliable measure of fair value is no longer available for an equity instrument that is not publicly traded but is measured at fair value through profit or loss, its fair value at the last date that instrument was reliably measurable is treated as the cost of the instrument, and it is measured at this cost amount less impairment until a reliable measure of fair value becomes available.

iii. Financial Assets that are Equity Instruments measured at Cost less Impairment

Equity instruments that are not publicly traded and whose fair value cannot otherwise be measured reliably without undue cost or effort, and contracts linked to such instruments that, if exercised, will result in delivery of such instruments, are measured at cost less impairment.

A financial liability is derecognised only when it is extinguished, i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires. An exchange between an existing borrower and lender of financial instruments with substantially different terms are accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability. Similarly, a substantial modification of the terms of an existing financial liability is accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability.

Any difference between the carrying amount of a financial liability extinguished or transferred to another party and the consideration paid, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

d. IMPAIRMENT OF FINANCIAL ASSETS

At the end of each reporting period, the Company assesses whether there is any objective evidence that financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost, are impaired.

The Company collectively considers factors to determine whether there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on loans and receivables has occurred.

If there is objective evidence that impairment losses have been incurred on financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the amount of impairment losses are measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate.

The carrying amounts of the financial assets are reduced through the use of an allowance account. Any impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately. If, in subsequent period, the amount of an impairment loss decreases, the previously recognised impairment losses are reversed directly, except for the amounts related to trade receivables which are reversed to write back the amount previously provided in the allowance account. The reversal is recognised in profit or loss immediately.

e. FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS AND BALANCES

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recognised in the functional currency at rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transactions.

At the end of each reporting period, foreign currency monetary items are translated using the closing rate. Non-monetary items that are measured at historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date of the transactions. Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined.

Exchange differences are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise except when a gain or loss on a non-monetary item is recognised in other comprehensive income. If so, any exchange differences relating to that gain or loss is recognised in other comprehensive income.

f. CASH FLOW STATEMENTS

The Company adopts indirect method in the preparation of cash flow statements.

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand, balances and deposits with banks and highly liquid investments which have an insignificant risk of changes in fair value with original maturities of three months or less, and are used by the Company in the management of their short term commitments. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents are presented net of bank overdrafts and pledged deposits, if any.

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4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

g. EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

i. Short term benefits

Wages, salaries, bonuses and social security contributions are recognised as an expense in the year in which the associated services are rendered by employees. Short term accumulating compensated absences such as paid annual leave are recognised when services are rendered by employees that increase their entitlement to future compensated absences. Short term non-accumulating compensated absences such as sick leave are recognised when the absences occur.

ii. Defined contribution plans

The Company makes contributions to the Employee Provident Fund in Malaysia, a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions to defined contribution pension schemes are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is performed.

iii. Termination benefits

Termination benefits are recognised as a liability and an expense when the Company is demonstrably committed to either terminate the employment of the employees before the normal retirement date, or provide termination benefits as a result of an offer made for voluntary redundancy. The Company is demonstrably committed to a termination when the Company has a detailed formal plan for the termination and are without realistic possibility of withdrawal.

Termination benefits in relation to the offer made to encourage voluntary redundancy are measured based on the number of employees expected to accept the offer.

h. PROVISIONS

A provision is recognised when the Company has an obligation, legal or constructive, at the reporting date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The risks and uncertainties are taken into account in reaching the best estimate of a provision. When the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount recognised in respect of the provision is the present value of the expenditure expected to be required to settle the obligation at a pre-tax rate.

Provisions are reviewed at the end of each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate.

Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses. If the Company has a contract that is onerous, the present obligation under the contract shall be recognised and measured as a provision.

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4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

i. INCOME TAXES

Income taxes include all domestic taxes on taxable profit. Income taxes also include other taxes, such as withholding taxes, that are payable by the Company, and real property gains taxes payable on disposal of properties, if any.

Tax payable on taxable profit for current and previous periods is recognised as a current tax liability to the extent unpaid. If the amount paid in respect of the current and past periods exceeds the amount payable for those periods, the excess is recognised as a current tax asset.

Current tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amounts expected to be paid or recovered, using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the reporting date.

Current tax liabilities and assets are offset if, and only if the Company has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and plan either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Deferred tax is recognised in full on temporary differences which are the differences between the carrying amounts in the financial statements and the corresponding tax base of an asset or liability at the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is not recognised in respect of the temporary differences associated with the initial recognition of an asset or a liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and at the time of the transactions, affects neither accounting profit nor taxable profit. Deferred tax are also not recognised for temporary difference associated with the initial recognition of goodwill.

A deferred tax asset is recognised only to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits would be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and unused tax credits can be utilised. The carrying amount of a deferred tax asset is reviewed at the end of each reporting period. If it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits would be available to allow the benefit of part or all of that recognised deferred tax asset to be utilised, the carrying amount of the deferred tax asset would be reduced accordingly. When it becomes probable that sufficient taxable profits would be available, such reductions would be reversed to the extent of the taxable profits.

Deferred tax liabilities and assets reflect the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects to recover or settle the carrying amounts of their assets and liabilities and are measured at the tax rates and laws that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the reporting date.

Changes in current or deferred tax balances are recognised as an income tax expense or credit and are recognised in the same component of comprehensive income or equity as the transaction that resulted in the tax expense or credit.

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4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

j. EQUITY INSTRUMENTS

Ordinary shares are classified as equity.

Equity instruments are measured at the fair value of the cash or other resources received or receivable, net of the direct costs of issuing the equity instruments. If payment is deferred and the time value of money is material, the initial measurement is on a present value basis.

k. REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenue from sale of goods is measured at the fair value of the consideration receivable and is recognised in profit or loss when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred to the buyer.

The following specific recognition criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

i. Provision of services

Revenue from services rendered is recognised net of service taxes and discounts as and when the services are performed.

5. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATES

The preparation of the Company's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the reporting date. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in the future.

a. JUDGEMENTS MADE IN APPLYING ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Critical judgements in applying the accounting policies

In the process of preparing the financial statements, there were no significant judgements made in applying the accounting policies of the Company which may have significant effects on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

b. KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the accounting policies of the Company which are described in Note 4, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

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5. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATES (continued)

b. Key sources of estimation uncertainty (continued)

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are discussed below:

i. Useful lives of plant and equipment

The Company regularly reviews the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment based on factors such as business plan and strategies, expected level of usage and future technological developments. Future results of operations could be materially affected by changes in these estimates brought about by changes in the factors mentioned above. A reduction in the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment would increase the recorded depreciation and decrease the value of property, plant and equipment.

ii. Recoverability of receivables

The Company makes allowance for doubtful receivables based on an assessment of the recoverability of trade and other receivables. An allowance is established for trade and other receivables where events or changes in circumstances indicate that the balances may not be collectible. The identification of doubtful receivables requires use of judgment and estimates. Where the expectation is different from the original estimate, such difference will impact the carrying value of the trade and other receivables and doubtful receivables expenses in the period in which such estimate has been changed.

iii. Deferred tax assets

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all unused tax losses, unabsorbed capital allowances and unused reinvestment allowances to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the losses, capital allowances and reinvestment allowances can be utilised. Significant management judgement is required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and level of future taxable profits. The total carrying value of recognised capital allowances, unrecognised tax losses, capital allowances and reinvestment allowances of the Company was given in Note 11.

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5. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATES (continued)

b. Key sources of estimation uncertainty (continued)

iv. Impairment of property, plant and equipment

The Company assesses impairment of assets whenever the events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable i.e. the carrying amount of the asset is more than the recoverable amount. Recoverable amount is measured at the higher of the fair value less cost to sell for that asset and its value-in-use. The value-in-use is the net present value of the projected future cash flow derived from that asset discounted at an appropriate discount rate. Projected future cash flows are based on Company's estimates calculated based on historical, sector and industry trends, general market and economic conditions, changes in technology and other available information. The assumptions used, results and conclusion of the impairment assessment are stated in the Note 6.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS 31 DECEMBER 2025

1. INTRODUCTION

Joint Venture Agreement (JVA) and Trust Deed between the Academy of Family Physicians of Malaysia (AFPM) and the Academy of Medicine of Malaysia (AMM) was ceremoniously signed on 28th July 2019 for the purpose of undertaking the purchase of land and/or building and/or the construction of academic building including the long-term development, operation and management of the academic building(s) to be acquired and/or erected.

The Parties hereby agree to change the name of the fund account held in the bank from “Joint Colleges Land Development Fund Account” to “Joint Academies Development Fund (JADF)”

The Parties hereby confirm and agree that the money in the JADF account, any land(s) and/or building(s) and/or property(ies) to be purchased, acquired and/or built shall be owned by the Parties in the following share(s) :-

- (a) AFPM shall own one-third (1/3) share; and
- (b) AMM shall own two-third (2/3) share

The Parties mutually agreed to form a Joint Board of Trustees to oversee the management of Joint Academies Development Fund (JADF), which for the purpose of the Trust/Trust Deed shall be deemed to be the Trust Account. To strengthen the business of this partnership, it was mutually agreed that Joint committee(s) such as the Academies Management Committee (AMC) and the Finance Committee (FC) be formed and shall be reporting and answerable to Joint Board of Trustees.

Joint Board of Trustees is authorised by the Parties to ensure that the Compensation Monies in the JADF shall primarily be utilized for financial management of the temporary office space, the purchase of land and/or buildings or for the construction of new academies building(s) and funds for academic development for the Parties.

On 3 December 2025, AMM & AFPM Sdn. Bhd. was incorporated to manage the business and financial operations of the Academies Malaysia Building effective from 1 January 2026.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of Joint Venture have been prepared in accordance with the Malaysian Private Entities Reporting Standard (“MPERS”).

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below :

3.1 PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised as an asset when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to Joint Venture and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. After recognition as an asset, an item of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Except for freehold land which is not depreciated, depreciation is provided on a straight-line method so as to write off the depreciable amount of the following assets over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

Depreciation of an asset begins when it is ready for its intended use.

If there is an indication of a significant change in factors affecting the residual value, useful life or asset consumption pattern since the last annual reporting date, the residual values, depreciation method and useful lives of depreciable assets are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively.

The carrying amounts of items of property, plant and equipment are derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from their use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising from the derecognition of items of property, plant and equipment, determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amounts of the item, is recognised in profit or loss.

3.2 FINANCIAL ASSETS

Financial assets are recognised in the statement of financial position when Joint Venture becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, financial assets are measured at transaction price.

After initial recognition, financial assets are classified into financial assets that are debt instruments measured at amortised cost.

JOINT ACADEMIES DEVELOPMENT FUND

i) Financial Assets That Are Debt Instruments Measured At Amortised Cost

After initial recognition, debt instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are classified as current assets are measured at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be received.

ii) Impairment Of Financial Assets

At the end of each reporting period, Joint Venture assesses whether there is any objective evidence that financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost, are impaired.

Impairment losses, in respect of financial assets measured at amortised cost, are measured as the differences between the assets' carrying amounts and the present values of their estimated cash flows discounted at the assets' original effective interest rate.

The carrying amounts of the financial assets are reduced directly, except for the carrying amounts of receivables which are reduced through the use of an allowance account. Any impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately. If, in subsequent period, the amount of an impairment loss decreases, the previously recognised impairment losses are reversed directly, except for the amounts related to receivables which are reversed to write back the amount previously provided in the allowance account. The reversal is recognised in profit or loss immediately.

iii) Derecognition Of Financial Assets

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial assets expire, or are settled, or Joint Venture transfers to another party substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial assets.

On derecognition of financial assets in their entirety, the differences between the carrying amounts and the sum of the consideration received and any cumulative gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period of the transfer.

3.3 CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents in the statement of cash flows comprise fixed deposits with a licensed bank, cash and bank balances.

3.4 FINANCIAL LIABILITIES

Financial liabilities are recognised in the statement of financial position when Joint Venture becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, financial liabilities are measured at transaction price.

After initial recognition, financial liabilities are classified into financial liabilities measured at amortised cost.

i) Financial Liabilities Measured At Amortised Cost

After initial recognition, financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss when the financial liabilities are derecognised or impaired.

ii) Derecognition Of Financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Any difference between the carrying amounts of the financial liabilities derecognised and the consideration paid is recognised in profit or loss.

3.5 REVENUE

Income is recognised on an accrual basis unless collectability is in doubt, in which case they are recognised on receipt basis.
